Our state is in crisis. There are urgent housing needs and long-term supply challenges that require immediate action. The state has been tasked with creating more annual housing starts than have been realized at any point in the past 45 years.

Urban Growth Boundaries in the state of Oregon have not only artificially restricted the supply of developable land, thus making housing less affordable, but they have also had a disparate impact on communities of color. Restrictions on development in these areas have done little more than further marginalize these groups and relegate them to dangerous urban centers replete with cramped and substandard housing, violent criminals walking the streets, and rampant exposure to bedbugs.
