For the record, my name is Melina Moran, Chair of the Oregon Commission for Hispanic Affairs (OCHA). OCHA serves the people of Oregon to empower and support Latinos through our special roles as policy advisors to Oregon state policymakers and leaders. OCHA is a catalyst that empowers partnerships between the state government and Hispanic communities in rural and urban areas to ensure success for all Latinos by addressing issues at the policy level. Today, I write to you in support of Oregon House Bill 2957.

There are over 11,000 Deferred Action for Childhood Arrival (DACA) recipients in the state of Oregon. They are teachers, medical professionals, business owners, and students who have made Oregon their home. People who were brought to the United States as children and have known no other home. Their parents made the decision to bring them here for a better life. For them to stay, they are forced to apply and renew DACA, costing them \$495 every two years plus legal fees. HB 2957, which would allocate funding and create a program to work with community-based organizations to provide financial assistance for DACA renewal and legal fees, could mean a life-saving difference for DACA recipients.
