I found out quickly that Mom would not get out of bed and walk unless I was there to do it myself. She would also not eat unless I gave it to her. The staff were wonderful but they did not have the time to do just those two important things that were so necessary for Mom to get better. They needed help. They needed to take care of fewer patients so each patient, including my mother, could get the care they needed.
