I am writing to encourage you to vote against advancing SB 303.

As someone who has worked in varying roles in healthcare for over a decade, I have had extensive experience in data collection and analysis in myriad areas. I understand the value and power inherent in tracking, collating and analyzing information.

While I can appreciate the intent of this bill in theory, there are <u>several concerns</u> that I have in its current written form.

Among them:

- Unclear or undefined parameters and responsibilities for OHSU or other private entities in how they profit from this data (financially or otherwise.)
- The unnecessary financial and operational burden to OHA, which is already overbudget for the OPS division.
- Unclear language and direction on the client's ability to opt-out of allowing their data to be shared.
- Potential unshared conflict of interests/lack of transparency on behalf of backers and supporters of this bill.

As Oregon embarks on leading the nation for this therapy modality, we should allow for flexibility and growth. SB303 **is unnecessary** at this stage, and there will already be a wealth of voluntary data as this program develops.

Please vote **against** this bill and leave OHSU and the industry to implement a *voluntary* research model we can all support.
