Dear Chair Reynolds, Vice-Chairs Nguyen and Scharf, and Members of the Committee:

I am writing in support of HB 2869-2 as the Chair of the Employment and the Economy Committee of Age-Friendly Portland and Multnomah County, the former director of the Institute on Aging at Portland State University, and as an older adult myself.

HB 2869-2 proposes the formation of a cross-sector stakeholder group that can craft a multisector plan for aging. Such a plan is critically important for our state given that:

- every single one of us, no matter our current age, is aging;
