Thank you for the opportunity to express my opinion and experiences regarding the Senate Bill 854. My name is Evelyn Buehler, and my pronouns are she/her. I am in 9th grade at Sunset High School in the Beaverton School District (BSD), an avid rock climber, and a member of Sunset's Climate Change Club.

I feel extremely fortunate to have been able to attend one of BSD's option middle school programs, Rachel Carson Environmental Science Middle School (RC). RC is a small, remarkable program that is led by six hardworking teachers who enlighten their students about climate justice. This occurs through the teachers' genuine care for each student, and the opportunities for which they put in countless hours to create. For example, each week the school goes on a "site visit", where we do volunteer work, work with a non-profit organization, or visit a different place to help us better understand our community. Some specific site visits I went on were planting at the Oregon Food Bank garden, removing invasive species from a restoration site, and visiting the Bonneville Dam to learn how hydroelectricity works. These experiences helped me to expand my thinking about how the world around me works.
