To: Chair Nosse and Members of the House Committee of Behavioral Health and Health Care,

I am a licensed clinical social worker in Portland, Oregon. I've been a fully licensed provider in Oregon since 2015, and I've run my own private practice since 2020. Please pass HB2455 to protect the rights of mental health providers in Oregon and to make mental health services more accessible to Oregon residents.

Current laws do not provide adequate protections to small businesses and sole proprietors, which discourages many providers like myself from accepting insurance and therefore limits access to necessary mental health care for many Oregon residents. Given that Oregon is currently ranked 49th for its provision of adult mental health services in the country, it is evident that we need to make policy changes in order to improve our state's mental health system. HB2455 is a step in the right direction.

Allowing insurance companies to recoup funds for up to 30 months creates an undue burden of financial risk to providers. Many other states have adopted restrictions similar to HB2455 that limit the timeline that insurance companies have to engage in audits and to pursue clawbacks. A 12-month period of recoupment is much more sensible and poses less risk of financial ruin for individual providers and small group practices compared with current policies. Additionally, the transparency this bill proposes for audits will enable providers to feel more confident accepting insurance and will increase access to care for many Oregonians that need it. Please pass this bill. Thank you for your consideration.
