Hello Committee members, and thank you for the opportunity to give testimony on Senate Bill 854. My name is Manogna Bobba, I am a senior at Westview High School and a future student of Oregon state university. I am the treasurer of The Interact Club partnered with Rotary, an Avid student and part of the Westview National Honors Society.

I want to share with you a little bit about my climate story. A couple years ago, when I first moved to the United States, there were multiple occurrences of wildfires that spread hours away from my place of residence but still, the side effects spread to areas way beyond my region. Wildfires made the air quality drop to a hazardous level. Since then, l've heard many more news of people losing homes and seeking help all due to the effect climate change has on our planet. In my home country of India, it has become a normal occurrence to experience power outages and pollution, which is also a problem that is heavily overlooked, yet watching the sun turn neon red and air turn into an ashy substance has surprised me to my core.

In the couple years I've lived in Oregon, it's become a normal practice to say the weather here is very unpredictable, but no one ever takes the time to wonder why we have cold summers or hot and rainy fall seasons. It is alarming to see how many people, in my own age group within high school, refuse to look into this problem because they believe they have no power over this due to their age. This bill can make a big impact on many people's lives as there are endless possibilities to be resourceful especially in a time and era such as the one we are living in.
