To the House Committee on Housing and Homelessness:

Do you remember the housing crash from 2008 – 2010 due to President Obama's putting pressure on banks and mortgage companies to give home loans to people without any down payment? It was a disaster for obvious reasons. Both bills attached above would do no favors to people who do not have the finances for a down payment and may not even be citizens (only an EIN is required).

There is a requirement for lending institutions to give the client a brochure on "home buyer education".

During the time of the earlier housing crash, we were visiting our son in California when a neighbor came buy asking for money to help as their home had been foreclosed. Perhaps adding the subject of how money is wasted which could have been saved toward a goal could be included.
