My name is Deborah Clark. I am a mother, grandmother, and retired scientist, living on a small farm in Linn County.

My personal experience has convinced me that energy-efficient and resilient homes that run on clean energy can lower household energy bills and protect people from extreme temperatures and air pollution.

- 1. My heat pump, along with energy-efficient windows and solar panels, has reduced my energy bill by approximately 85%.
- During the 38 years I have lived in Oregon, I had no need of air-conditioning until recently. Cooling air from my heat pump has made the increased summer temperatures and heat domes bearable these last few years.
- 3. Moreover, during the summer days when wildfire smoke polluted the air, cooling air from my heat pump and insulated windows allowed me to close up the house and still maintain a comfortable temperature indoors pollution-free.

Financial incentives from the state of Oregon and the federal government made it financially viable for me to make my home more energy-efficient and resilient.
