I Oppose HB 2002, and it is not the right choice for the great state of Oregon or its citizens.

Ten Reasons I Oppose HB 2002

- 1. It limits the ability of individuals to make informed decisions about their own reproductive health care, as it restricts access to information and services.
- 2. It creates a right of civil action for individuals and healthcare facilities which could lead to costly legal battles.
- 3. It requires student health centers to provide access to emergency contraception and medication abortion, which could be seen as a violation of religious freedom.
- 4. It requires insurance carriers to provide coverage for gender-affirming treatments, which could lead to higher premiums for individuals.
- 5. It requires the Oregon Health Authority to provide annual training to public institutions of higher education, which could be seen as a waste of resources.
- 6. It requires the Higher Education Coordinating Commission to submit an annual report to the Legislative Assembly, which could be seen as an unnecessary burden.
- 7. It creates a new crime of interfering with a healthcare facility, which could be seen as an infringement on civil liberties.
- 8. It creates an exemption from public records disclosure for the names and addresses of reproductive and gender-affirming healthcare service providers, which could be seen as a violation of transparency.
- 9. It requires the Office of Rural Health to administer a program to provide grants to two federally qualified health centers in rural and medically underserved areas, which could be seen as a misuse of funds.
- 10. It requires the Oregon Health Authority to implement reproductive health services and education programs, which could be seen as an intrusion on personal freedom.
