During the wildfires of 2020, I worked with my daughter to collect supplies to donate to people in need, and saw that it was small collectives of community members and nonprofits who were organizing to respond on the ground to help people. These efforts need to be supported and unified, and having core community hubs that people trust and know they can turn to in each neighborhood seems like an excellent way to build resilience.
