The International Association of Chiefs of Police put out a statement. "The criminal use of semiautomatic assault weapons pose a great risk to our officers and the communities they are sworn to protect." Ghost guns are made from components that have no serial numbers, are made from easily-obtained kits purchased on the internet, or undetectable materials printed on 3D printers at home, and require no background checks of any kind.
