Please consider the refusal of implementing a rent increase of 3% plus CPI with a cap of 8%, as well as TRIPLING the relocation fees for tenants when a landlord needs to repair, sell or have family move into our property. Without charging enough to recoup for repairs and renovations, the high current interest rates and housing prices, the cost of homeowners insurance and EVER INCREASING property taxes, along with skyrocketing inflation, your proposed monetary burdens would be financially unbearable.
