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Chair Patterson, Vice-Chair Hayden, and Members of the Senate Committee on Health Care:

I am writing to express my strong support for Senate Bill 1076, which addresses the urgent need for better discharge planning for homeless residents, to prevent needless deaths from cold and other inclement weather conditions. As a concerned citizen of Oregon, I believe that every human being deserves access to basic healthcare, and it is our collective responsibility to ensure that vulnerable populations, including the homeless, are not left to suffer and die needlessly.

Homelessness is a complex issue that affects communities across the America, and Oregon is no exception. While there are many different factors that contribute to homelessness, one of the most pressing concerns is the lack of access to medical care and safety when it is needed most, especially during extreme weather conditions through the winter months. When temperatures drop below freezing, homeless individuals are at increased risk of hypothermia, frostbite, and other serious health complications. I believe that Senate Bill 1076 represents an important step towards addressing the needs of homeless residents in our community and ensuring that they receive the care and support they need to stay healthy and safe. By exercising caution with discharge decisions, Senate Bill 1076 will require hospitals to create a best practice system for homeless patients, to prevent needless suffering and death among some of the most vulnerable members of our society.

I urge you to support Senate Bill 1076 and take action to address the urgent healthcare needs of homeless residents of our community.
