Re: OMA Comments in Support of HB 3298 – Oregon Perinatal Collaborative Funding

The Oregon Medical Association (OMA) would like to express strong support for HB 3298 which provides funding for Oregon Perinatal Collaborative (OPC), an organization within Oregon Health and Science University (OHSU) working to lower maternal mortality rates statewide. This bill would direct the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) to disperse \$1,000,000 to OPC, so they can continue their work to save the lives of Oregon's mothers and newborns.

According to the recently released Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) report, *Maternal Mortality Rates in the United States*, 2021, maternal mortality rates have risen almost 40% since 2020, and are over four times what they were in 2005. This report also reflects broad racial disparity finding that Black, American Indian and Alaskan Natives suffer with maternal mortality rates 2-4 times higher overall.

With the support of CDC grants, OPC has become a vital asset in the fight to save the lives our state's vulnerable birthing population with several successful initiatives and partnerships. The instability of solely relying on federal grant funding puts the OPC at risk of being forced to halt the work they do for Oregonians.

State funding would ensure Oregon has a dedicated organization working to provide advocacy and resources for equitable perinatal care in our communities. This reflects a successful model several other states have adopted to ensure they have a devoted perinatal collaborative working
