Chair Bynum and members of the committee,

My testimony is listed as neutral, but that implies that I am in the middle on HB 3431. I strongly support fully funding the Economic Equity Investment Program and strongly oppose taking funding from Measure 110 programs.

I am testifying as an individual who worked in behavioral health for over 50 years, but now serve on the Washington County Behavioral Health Council. At our last meeting we were briefed on the progress in the county under Measure 110, uniting 19 substance use disorder programs under the one umbrella of the Washington County Behavioral Health Resource Network (BHRN). I attach a list of those programs below.

What was most exciting to me was the breadth of the programs and the fact that this funding had given us resources to expand the power of programs serving populations who had not been fully served in the past. The program also provides support within the network so that new programs get a running start. This means that we can much better address the crisis of behavioral health within our diverse communities. In addition, the emphasis on peer involvement is providing a powerful career path for many in our community. These first steps of crafting a program that works are nearing completion - we are starting to see the results of this funding, as you will hear from many program participants and staff.

I strongly support full funding of the Economic Equity Investment Program. However, if we significantly reduce funding to measure 110 programs emerging answers to the horrific impact of substance use disorder, we work at odds to the very thing we are trying to accomplish.
