My name is Paul Runge and I'm writing to support this bill. I live near two ODOT Orphan Highways: SE Powell Blvd and SE 82nd Ave. I walk, bike, take transit, and drive to get around.

The most dangerous thing I do every day is use those two ODOT facilities. When I drive on them, I see people speeding at levels that match the road's outdated highway design but that are totally inappropriate given the roads' neighborhood context. When I walk on those facilities, I dodge traffic, have to go out of my way to find crosswalks, and have near misses with cars, especially after dark. I regularly ask myself when I cross Powell or 82nd at night: "What would happen if I tripped?" By and large, people do not stop for pedestrians at intersections, even those with crosswalks. By and large, people speed in these long overbuilt straightaways. And I think, by and large, people who trip risk simply getting run over.

What will happen to my future children? How will I navigate protecting their safety while having such a deadly force right outside my door in two directions?

It's time we fix these streets: build them to move slower, to offer more visibility, to protect pedestrians and bikes. Fund the Great Streets program and help us build safer, slower, multimodal facilities throughout the state.
