Perhaps they could rewrite the bills to accomplish this, and eliminate any changes to the testing and certification of our highly valued dental assistants.

I have four dental assistants in my office and they were all very opposed to the removal of a standardized test and elimination of credentials. One said she would consider leaving the career if her current credentials became obsolete and meaningless, which is exactly what these bills will do.

Honestly ask yourself, do you want to go to a professional dental office, pay top drawer fees, and have a dental assistant practice taking X-rays on you? Or your loved ones? If you wanted that experience you would go to the dental school! Public safety has to be a top priority for our legislators and healthcare professionals.
