Dear Chair Fahey, Vice-Chairs Breese-Iverson and Kropf, and members of the House Committee on Rules,

My name is Kelly McCurdy. I live in Northeast Portland and I am writing to express my full support for HB3568. I am an educator who spent six years teaching in Title I schools in our community, working with and in service of our community members who provide for their families through industries like warehousing.

During the peak of the COVID-19 vaccine distributions, I volunteered at the Portland Convention Center, where I had the privilege of working alongside employees of Amazon's Troutdale warehouse, who were somehow dedicating their spare time to serve others. I saw firsthand the hard work and dedication that these individuals put into our community. And as we worked together, they told me about their work at the warehouse, where they faced long hours with unattainable, dangerous, and demeaning quotas simply to provide for their families.
