SJR 33 is unwise for the future of healthcare in Oregon. I love my state and have loved my practice as a physician here for over 30 years. The majority of Oregonians believe there needs to be some regulation for abortion and gender care. To enshrine in the constitution these controversial medical and healthcare practices, is ill advised and politically motivated as opposed to concern for our Oregon patients. Desistance of gender dysphoria for those individuals prepuberty is 73-94 % in various research articles, even listed with WPATH. So we need more research and studies to care for these individuals long term. You are promoting healthcare that has subsequent problems to all sorts of medical issues, including musculoskeletal, cardiovascular, endocrine, reproductive, and mental.
