Dear Chair Golden, Vice Chair Girod, and members of the Committee,

On behalf of Oregon League of Conservation Voters and Oregon Conservation Network, I submit this testimony in support of HB 3464 that removes beavers from the “predatory animal” statute.

The ecological and ecosystem benefits of beavers have been well documented. They are referred to as “nature’s engineers” for their ability to modify their habitat in ways that help several other species, including salmon. It is becoming increasingly known that beavers also provide benefits to human communities and increase our resilience to climate change impacts such as wildfires and droughts – two problems that are very prevalent in Oregon.

Yet, as a state, we have provided little to no support to this species so they can continue to build our climate resilience. Because of their classification as a “predatory animal” there is no population


monitoring on private lands and no understanding of how many beavers are being killed in the state, and how that might be affecting our ecosystems.

Instead of focusing on only the potential damage beavers might cause, we are urging you to also account for their benefits – from water quality and accessibility, to stream temperature regulation and wildfire breaks. These benefits warrant that we do more for beavers in the Beaver State.

**HB 3464** is a step toward acknowledging beaver's role in Oregon's landscape by making informed management decisions on beaver take. The bill does NOT prevent landowners from killing beavers in response to damage but rather it will give landowners the opportunity and information on attempting voluntary mitigation, if they choose to.

I urge this Committee to think of beavers as a tool in our toolbox to fight climate change impacts – both on natural as well as on human communities. Killing animals without any accountability does not set a good precedent for wildlife management in the state. Please fix this erroneous classification of beavers under Oregon statute so we can all benefit from having beavers on our landscape and be proud of calling ourselves the beaver state.
