**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO  
HOUSE BILL 2001**

1 In line 2 of the printed bill, after “housing” insert “; creating new pro-  
2 visions; amending ORS 90.394, 94.536, 105.115, 105.124, 105.135, 105.137,  
3 195.033, 195.036, 195.060, 195.141, 195.143, 195.145, 195.300, 197.015, 197.286,  
4 197.290, 197.291, 197.293, 197.296, 197.297, 197.298, 197.299, 197.302, 197.303,  
5 197.304, 197.307, 197.313, 197.319, 197.320, 197.335, 197.480, 197.522, 197.637,  
6 197.764, 197.831, 197A.300, 197A.305, 197A.310, 197A.312, 197A.320, 215.457,  
7 215.501, 270.005, 456.586, 458.650, 466.055 and 527.755 and section 8, chapter  
8 420, Oregon Laws 2021, sections 1, 2 and 6, chapter 531, Oregon Laws 2021,  
9 and sections 6 and 9, chapter 552, Oregon Laws 2021; repealing ORS 197.178,  
10 197.766, 197A.405, 197A.407, 197A.409, 197A.411 and 197A.413; and declaring  
11 an emergency”.

14 **“OREGON HOUSING NEEDS ANALYSIS**

15

16 **“SECTION 1. (1) There is established within the Oregon Department**  
17 **of Administrative Services the Oregon Housing Needs Analysis. The**  
18 **purposes of the Oregon Housing Needs Analysis are to further the:**

19 **“(a) Production of housing to meet the need of Oregonians at all**  
20 **levels of affordability; and**

21 **“(b) Production of housing in a way that creates more housing**

1 choice by affirmatively furthering fair housing, as defined in ORS  
2 197.290.

3 “(2) The Oregon Housing Needs Analysis consists of three compo-  
4 nents as follows:

5 “(a) The annual statewide housing analysis under section 2 (1) of  
6 this 2023 Act;

7 “(b) The allocated housing need under section 2 (2) of this 2023 Act;  
8 and

9 “(c) The housing production targets under section 3 of this 2023 Act.

10 “(3) Actions taken by the department under sections 1 to 3 of this  
11 2023 Act are not subject to ORS 197.180 and are not land use decisions.

12 “(4) The Department of Land Conservation and Development and  
13 the Housing and Community Services Department:

14 “(a) Shall assist the Oregon Department of Administrative Services  
15 with its duties under sections 1 to 3 of this 2023 Act.

16 “(b) May study and recommend methodological changes to the  
17 Oregon Department of Administrative Services to improve the Oregon  
18 Housing Needs Analysis’ functions and suitability for its purposes un-  
19 der subsection (1) of this section. The departments may solicit written  
20 and oral public testimony to inform their recommendations.

21 **“SECTION 2. (1) On an annual basis the Oregon Department of**  
22 **Administrative Services shall conduct a statewide housing analysis.**  
23 **The analysis must be conducted statewide and segmented into regions**  
24 **as determined by the department. The analysis shall estimate factors**  
25 **including, but not limited to:**

26 “(a) Projected needed housing units over the next 20 years;

27 “(b) Current housing underproduction;

28 “(c) Housing units needed for people experiencing homelessness;  
29 and

30 “(d) Housing units projected to be converted into vacation homes

1 or second homes during the next 20 years.

2 “(2) At the time the department performs the housing analysis un-  
3 der subsection (1) of this section, the department shall allocate a  
4 housing need for each city.

5 “(3) In making an allocation under subsection (2) of this section,  
6 the department shall consider:

7 “(a) The forecasted population growth under ORS 195.033 or 195.036;

8 “(b) The forecasted regional job growth;

9 “(c) An equitable statewide distribution of housing for income levels  
10 described in subsection (4) of this section;

11 “(d) The estimates made under subsection (1) of this section; and

12 “(e) The purpose of the Oregon Housing Needs Analysis under sec-  
13 tion 1 (1) of this 2023 Act.

14 “(4) In estimating and allocating housing need under this section,  
15 the department shall segment need by the following income levels:

16 “(a) Housing affordable to households making less than 30 percent  
17 of median family income;

18 “(b) Housing affordable to households making 30 percent or more  
19 and less than 60 percent of median family income;

20 “(c) Housing affordable to households making 60 percent or more  
21 and less than 80 percent of median family income;

22 “(d) Housing affordable to households making 80 percent or more  
23 and less than 120 percent of median family income; and

24 “(e) Housing affordable to households making 120 percent or more  
25 of median family income.

26 **“SECTION 3. (1) The Oregon Department of Administrative Services**  
27 **shall allocate housing production targets to each city with a popu-**  
28 **lation of 10,000 or greater and to each unincorporated urbanized area**  
29 **within the Metro urban growth boundary. Housing production targets**  
30 **shall describe the proportion of the allocated housing need that the**

1 department determines should be produced in each city within six  
2 years for a city or urbanized area inside Metro and within eight years  
3 for a city or urbanized area outside Metro.

4 “(2) The housing production targets must be separated into:

5 “(a) A total target; and

6 “(b) A target for publicly supported housing affordable to house-  
7 holds making less than 80 percent of the median family income.

8 “(3) In establishing housing production targets under this section,  
9 the department:

10 “(a) May include a greater proportion of the allocated housing need  
11 to accommodate people experiencing homelessness and housing  
12 underproduction within a city;

13 “(b) Is not required to consider allocation of needed housing by  
14 Metro under ORS 197.296 or 197.303; and

15 “(c) Shall coordinate the allocation of the targets with a schedule  
16 developed by the Department of Land Conservation and Development  
17 for requiring housing production strategies under ORS 197.290.

18 **“SECTION 4. (1) The Housing and Community Services Department**  
19 **may adopt rules to implement this section and section 5 of this 2023**  
20 **Act.**

21 “(2) On an annual basis the Housing and Community Services De-  
22 partment shall update a publicly available statewide housing pro-  
23 duction dashboard.

24 “(3) The dashboard shall include, for each city with a population  
25 of 10,000 or greater:

26 “(a) Progress toward housing production by affordability levels, as  
27 described in section 2 (4) of this 2023 Act and total housing targets;  
28 and

29 “(b) A comparative analysis of progress in comparison to the region  
30 and other local governments with similar market types.

1       “(4) Information in the dashboard must be based on:

2       “(a) Inventory of publicly supported housing, as defined in ORS  
3 456.250, that is maintained by the department; and

4       “(b) Information submitted to the department under section 37 (3)  
5 of this 2023 Act.

6       “SECTION 5. (1) On an annual basis the Housing and Community  
7 Services Department shall update publicly available statewide housing  
8 equity indicators.

9       “(2) The indicators shall include, for each city, quantifiable data,  
10 to the extent that the department can determine, define or estimate  
11 it, displaying:

12       “(a) Housing outcomes, such as cost burden and availability of  
13 housing units to own or to rent, and housing condition for various  
14 demographics, including race or ethnicity, disability status, English  
15 proficiency and age;

16       “(b) Housing types produced and overall land efficiency of housing  
17 production;

18       “(c) New housing units built to standards, as defined by the De-  
19 partment of Consumer and Business Services by rule, relating to ac-  
20 cessibility and visitability;

21       “(d) Risk of gentrification and displacement;

22       “(e) Housing segregation by race and income;

23       “(f) Environmentally just housing outcomes, informed by the envi-  
24 ronmental justice mapping tool, developed by the Environmental Jus-  
25 tice Council under section 12, chapter 58, Oregon Laws 2022;

26       “(g) Residential tenants who spend more than 50 percent of their  
27 household income on gross rent for housing; and

28       “(h) Other measurable factors or indicators identified by the de-  
29 partment.

30       “SECTION 6. (1) No later than March 1, 2024, the Department of

1 Land Conservation and Development shall adopt a housing production  
2 target schedule under section 3 (3)(c) of this 2023 Act.

3 “(2) No later than January 1, 2025, the Oregon Department of Ad-  
4 ministrative Services shall:

5 “(a) Conduct the initial statewide housing analysis and the initial  
6 estimate and allocation of housing need under section 2 of this 2023  
7 Act.

8 “(b) Establish the initial housing production targets under section  
9 3 of this 2023 Act.

10 “(3) No later than January 1, 2025, the Housing and Community  
11 Services Department shall:

12 “(a) Publish the statewide housing production dashboard under  
13 section 4 of this 2023 Act; and

14 “(b) Publish statewide housing equity indicators under section 5 of  
15 this 2023 Act.

16 “(4) The schedule adopted by the Department of Land Conservation  
17 and Development under subsection (1) of this section is not a land use  
18 decisions and is not subject to appeal.

19 “SECTION 7. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropri-  
20 ation, there is appropriated for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023,  
21 out of the General Fund:

22 “(1) To the Housing and Community Services Department, the  
23 amount of \$\_\_\_, to perform the duties of the department under  
24 sections 1 to 5 of this 2023 Act.

25 “(2) To the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, the  
26 amount of \$\_\_\_, to perform the duties of the department under  
27 sections 1 to 5 of this 2023 Act.

“URBANIZATION GENERALLY

30

1       **“SECTION 8. (1) In adopting rules under ORS 197.286 to 197.314 and**  
2 **statewide planning goals relating to housing or urbanization, or ad-**  
3 **ministering the rules or statutes, the Land Conservation and Devel-**  
4 **opment Commission and Department of Land Conservation and**  
5 **Development shall be guided by the following principles:**

6       **“(a) Housing that is safe, accessible and affordable in the commu-**  
7 **nity of their choice should be available to every Oregonian.**

8       **“(b) Building enough equitable housing must be a top priority.**

9       **“(c) The development and implementation of the housing pro-**  
10 **duction strategy should be the focal point by which the department**  
11 **collaborates with local governments to address and eliminate local**  
12 **barriers to housing production.**

13       **“(d) Expertise, technical assistance, model ordinances and other**  
14 **tools and resources to address housing production should be provided**  
15 **to local governments, using cooperative planning tools embodied in**  
16 **ORS 197.291 and 197.293, but not to the exclusion of the expedient use**  
17 **of enforcement authority, including compliance orders under ORS**  
18 **197.319 to 197.335.**

19       **“(e) Housing production should support fair and equitable housing**  
20 **outcomes, environmental justice, climate resilience and access to op-**  
21 **portunity.**

22       **“(f) Housing production should not be undermined by litigation,**  
23 **regulatory uncertainty or repetitive or unnecessary procedures.**

24       **“(g) Local governments, to the greatest extent possible, should take**  
25 **actions within their control to facilitate the production of housing to**  
26 **meet housing production targets under section 3 of this 2023 Act.**

27       **“(2) Each public body, as defined in ORS 174.109, shall use its au-**  
28 **thority to remove barriers to, and to create pathways for, the devel-**  
29 **opment of needed housing and shall collaborate with the department**  
30 **and local governments to identify and implement strategies to support**

1 housing production where there is insufficient housing production and  
2 choice.

3 “(3) In adopting rules implementing ORS 197.286 to 197.314 and  
4 statewide land use goals relating to housing and urbanization, the  
5 commission may approve a range of methodologies, policy options or  
6 assumptions that a local government may adopt in determining:

7 “(a) Needed housing;

8 “(b) Housing production strategies or housing coordination strate-  
9 gies;

10 “(c) Buildable lands or housing capacity;

11 “(d) Amendments to urban growth boundaries, including under ORS  
12 197.296 (6)(a), 197.299, 197.764 and 197A.300 to 197A.325 and section 22  
13 (5)(a) of this 2023 Act; or

14 “(e) Adoption or amendments to urban reserves or rural reserves  
15 under ORS 195.137 to 195.145.

16 “SECTION 9. (1) The Land Conservation and Development Com-  
17 mission shall adopt rules and amendments to rules related to  
18 urbanization as follows:

19 “(a) On or before January 1, 2025, to implement ORS 197.290, 197.291,  
20 197.293, 197.319 (4), 197.320 (13) and 197.335 (6); and

21 “(b) On or before January 1, 2026, to implement ORS 197.286 to  
22 197.314, except as provided in paragraph (a) of this subsection.

23 “(2) In adopting rules under this section, the commission shall pri-  
24 oritize:

25 “(a) Facilitating and encouraging housing production, affordability  
26 and housing choice on buildable lands within an urban growth bound-  
27 ary;

28 “(b) Providing greater clarity and certainty in the adoption and  
29 acknowledgement of housing capacity analyses, urban growth bound-  
30 ary amendments, urban growth boundary exchanges or urban reserves



1 to accommodate an identified housing need;

2 “(c) Reducing analytical burden, minimizing procedural redundancy  
3 and increasing legal certainty for local governments pursuing urban  
4 growth boundary amendments, urban growth boundary exchanges or  
5 urban reserves where a housing need is identified, especially for  
6 smaller cities, consistent with the appropriate protection of resource  
7 lands; and

8 “(d) Supporting coordinated public facilities planning, annexation,  
9 and comprehensive plan amendments to facilitate the development of  
10 lands brought into an urban growth boundary.

11 “(3) In adopting rules under subsection (1)(a) of this section, the  
12 commission shall:

13 “(a) Consult with the Housing and Community Services Depart-  
14 ment, Department of Transportation, Department of Environmental  
15 Quality, Department of State Lands, Oregon Business Development  
16 Department and Department of Consumer and Business Services;

17 “(b) Provide clear parameters on the types and extent of actions  
18 needed or allowed under ORS 197.290 (3) that are consistent with the  
19 technical and resource capacities of varying sizes of local govern-  
20 ments; and

21 “(c) Recognize actions already taken by local governments.

22 “(4) To avoid interference with current planning activities or to  
23 avoid unjust or surprising results, the Land Conservation and Devel-  
24 opment Commission may postpone, for cities specified by the com-  
25 mission, the applicability of sections 13, 21, 22 or 23 of this 2023 Act  
26 and the amendments to ORS 197.286, 197.290, 197.296, 197.297 and 197.303,  
27 by sections 12 and 25 to 28 of this 2023 Act, until a date that is not later  
28 than January 1, 2026.

29 “SECTION 10. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropri-  
30 ation, there is appropriated to the Department of Land Conservation

1 and Development, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, out of the  
2 General Fund, the amount of \$\_\_\_, to adopt rules under section 9 of  
3 this 2023 Act.

4 **“SECTION 11.** In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropri-  
5 ation, there is appropriated to the Department of Land Conservation  
6 and Development, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, out of the  
7 General Fund, the amount of \$\_\_\_, to adopt rules under section 9 of  
8 this 2023 Act.

9 **“SECTION 12.** ORS 197.286, as amended by section 5, chapter 54, Oregon  
10 Laws 2022, is amended to read:

11 “197.286. As used in ORS 197.286 to 197.314 and 197.475 to 197.490:

12 “(1) **‘Allocated housing need’ means:**

13 **“(a) For a city outside Metro, the housing need allocated to a city**  
14 **under section 2 (2) of this 2023 Act as segmented by income level under**  
15 **section 2 (4) of this 2023 Act; or**

16 **“(b) For a city within Metro, the housing need allocated to the city**  
17 **by Metro under ORS 197.303 (3).**

18 **“[(1)] (2) ‘Buildable lands’ means lands in urban and urbanizable areas**  
19 **that are suitable, available and necessary for [residential uses. ‘Buildable**  
20 **lands’ includes] the development of needed housing over a 20-year**  
21 **planning period, including both vacant land and developed land likely to**  
22 **be redeveloped.**

23 **“[(2)] (3) ‘Government assisted housing’ means housing that is financed**  
24 **in whole or part by either a federal or state housing agency or a housing**  
25 **authority as defined in ORS 456.005, or housing that is occupied by a tenant**  
26 **or tenants who benefit from rent supplements or housing vouchers provided**  
27 **by either a federal or state housing agency or a local housing authority.**

28 **“(4) ‘Housing capacity’ means the number of needed housing units**  
29 **that can be developed on buildable lands within the 20-year planning**  
30 **period based on the land’s comprehensive plan designation and capac-**

1 **ity for housing development and redevelopment.**

2 **“(5) ‘Housing production strategy’ means a strategy adopted by a**  
3 **local government to promote housing production under ORS 197.290.**

4 **“[(3)] (6) ‘Manufactured dwelling,’ ‘manufactured dwelling park,’ ‘manu-**  
5 **factured home’ and ‘mobile home park’ have the meanings given those terms**  
6 **in ORS 446.003.**

7 **“(7) ‘Needed housing’ has the meaning given that term in section**  
8 **23 of this 2023 Act, except as provided in ORS 197.303.**

9 **“[(4)] (8) ‘Periodic review’ means the process and procedures as set forth**  
10 **in ORS 197.628 to 197.651.**

11 **“[(5)] (9) ‘Prefabricated structure’ means a prefabricated structure, as de-**  
12 **fin ed in ORS 455.010, that is relocatable, more than eight and one-half feet**  
13 **wide and designed for use as a single-family dwelling.**

14 **“[(6) ‘Urban growth boundary’ means an urban growth boundary included**  
15 **or referenced in a comprehensive plan.]**

16 **“SECTION 13. (1) At the time that a city is required to inventory**  
17 **its buildable lands under ORS 197.297 (1) or section 21 or 22 of this 2023**  
18 **Act, the local government shall determine the amount of buildable**  
19 **lands that are likely to support the production of housing during the**  
20 **period of their housing production target under section 3 (1) of this**  
21 **section, because the lands are:**

22 **“(a) Currently annexed and zoned to allow housing through clear**  
23 **and objective standards and procedures;**

24 **“(b) Readily served through adjacent public facilities or identified**  
25 **for the near-term provision of public facilities through an adopted**  
26 **capital improvement plan; and**

27 **“(c) Not encumbered by any applicable local, state or federal pro-**  
28 **TECTIVE regulations or have appropriate entitlements to prepare the**  
29 **land for development.**

30 **“(2) If the total housing production target is greater than the**

1 **housing capacity of development-ready lands, the local government**  
2 **shall take any actions in ORS 197.290 (3) that demonstrably prepare**  
3 **lands for development or redevelopment or increase the housing ca-**  
4 **capacity of existing development-ready lands.**

## “HOUSING PRODUCTION ACCOUNTABILITY

7

8 **“SECTION 14.** ORS 197.293 is amended to read:

9 *“197.293. [(1) The Land Conservation and Development Commission, in*  
10 *consultation with the Housing and Community Services Department, shall*  
11 *adopt criteria for reviewing and identifying cities with a population greater*  
12 *than 10,000 that have not sufficiently:]*

13 *“[(a) Achieved production of needed housing within their jurisdiction; or]*

14 *“[(b) Implemented a housing production strategy adopted under ORS*  
15 *197.290.]*

16 *“[(2) The criteria adopted by the commission under subsection (1) of this*  
17 *section may include the city’s:]*

18 *“[(a) Unmet housing need as described in ORS 197.296 (6);]*

19 *“[(b) Unmet housing need in proportion to the city’s population;]*

20 *“[(c) Percentage of households identified as severely rent burdened as de-*  
21 *scribed in ORS 456.586;]*

22 *“[(d) Recent housing development;]*

23 *“[(e) Recent adoption of a housing production strategy under ORS 197.290*  
24 *or adoption of actions pursuant to a housing production strategy;]*

25 *“[(f) Recent or frequent previous identification by the Department of Land*  
26 *Conservation and Development under this section; or]*

27 *“[(g) Other attributes that the commission considers relevant.]*

28 *“[(3) The Department of Land Conservation and Development may review*  
29 *cities under the criteria adopted under subsection (2) of this section for the*  
30 *purposes of prioritizing actions by the department, including:]*

1       “[(a) Awarding available technical or financial resources;]

2       “[(b) Providing enhanced review and oversight of the city’s housing pro-  
3       duction strategy;]

4       “[(c) Requiring a report and explanation if a city does not implement an  
5       action within the approximate time frame scheduled within a housing pro-  
6       duction strategy;]

7       “[(d) Entering into agreements with the city relating to the city’s modifica-  
8       tion or implementation of its housing production strategy; or]

9       “[(e) Petitioning the commission to act under ORS 197.319 to 197.335 to  
10       require the city to comply with ORS 197.286 to 197.314 or statewide land use  
11       planning goals related to housing or urbanization.]

12       **“(1) In developing and implementing this section and performing its  
13       duties under ORS 197.319 (4), the Department of Land Conservation  
14       and Development shall be guided by section 8 (1) of this 2023 Act and  
15       the following principles:**

16       **“(a) Increasing housing production;**

17       **“(b) Developing affordable and equitable housing;**

18       **“(c) Forming partnerships with cities and with other public bodies;**

19       **“(d) Responding proportionately to housing underproduction;**

20       **“(e) Escalating enforcement to address persistent, repeated or de-  
21       liberate noncompliance with housing production targets; and**

22       **“(f) Considering the availability of state resources to support hous-  
23       ing production.**

24       **“(2) In determining whether a city should be referred under sub-  
25       section (3) of this section, the department may base its evaluation on  
26       the relative performance of a city based on any one of, or any combi-  
27       nation of, the following:**

28       **“(a) A city’s progress proportionate to its population size, as dem-  
29       onstrated by the statewide housing production dashboard under sec-  
30       tion 4 of this 2023 Act.**

1       **“(b) The city’s performance as demonstrated by a statewide housing**  
2 **equity indicator under section 5 of this 2023 Act.**

3       **“(3) Each year, the department shall refer into its housing acceler-**  
4 **ation program, under subsection (4) of this section:**

5       **“(a) For each region, as established in the Oregon Housing Needs**  
6 **Analysis under section 1 (1) of this 2023 Act, of those cities that**  
7 **adopted a housing production strategy more than three but less than**  
8 **four years ago, including as required by subsection (7)(a) of this sec-**  
9 **tion, the lowest performing cities as determined under subsection (2)**  
10 **of this section;**

11       **“(b) Each city that has failed to adopt a housing production strat-**  
12 **egy by the deadline under ORS 197.290 (1);**

13       **“(c) Each city that has failed to undertake actions in its housing**  
14 **production strategy by the deadline under ORS 197.290 (4); and**

15       **“(d) Cities referred under ORS 197.319 (4).**

16       **“(4) For each city referred to the housing acceleration program,**  
17 **within six months, the department shall, in cooperation with the city,**  
18 **complete an audit of specific housing barriers, that must include an**  
19 **analysis of the following factors affecting housing production,**  
20 **affordability and choice:**

21       **“(a) The existing housing production strategy and the documents**  
22 **and record supporting the strategy;**

23       **“(b) Public written comments and invited stakeholder feedback re-**  
24 **ceived by a date specified by the department;**

25       **“(c) Land use planning regulations, including zoning and develop-**  
26 **ment code;**

27       **“(d) Permitting and approval processes relating to development of**  
28 **housing and infrastructure supporting housing;**

29       **“(e) Required fees, exactions and improvements;**

30       **“(f) Actions and inactions that can impact fair and equitable hous-**

1 **ing outcomes, environmental justice, climate resilience and location**  
2 **choice;**

3 **“(g) Local resource deficiencies, including staffing, public facilities,**  
4 **capital improvements to infrastructure, availability of buildable lands**  
5 **and actions or investments to prepare land for development;**

6 **“(h) Specific additional state resources that could support housing**  
7 **production;**

8 **“(i) Changes to state laws or rules or the regulations, policies,**  
9 **actions or inactions of any public body, as defined in ORS 174.109, as**  
10 **that could impact housing production; and**

11 **“(j) Other factors limiting housing that are not within the city’s**  
12 **control.**

13 **“(5) In performing an audit under subsection (4) of this section, the**  
14 **department:**

15 **“(a) May request concurrent review of the city’s affordability poli-**  
16 **cies under ORS 197.637; and**

17 **“(b) Shall notify any public body identified under subsection (4)(j)**  
18 **of this section.**

19 **“(6) Within six months following an audit under subsection (4) of**  
20 **this section, the city and the department must enter into a housing**  
21 **acceleration agreement that is based on and proportionate to the city’s**  
22 **basis for referral under subsection (3) of this section and informed by**  
23 **the audit under subsection (4) of this section.**

24 **“(7) Under the housing acceleration agreement, the department**  
25 **shall agree to provide:**

26 **“(a) Specified technical assistance, regulatory support and other**  
27 **assistance, to assist the city in performing its agreement under sub-**  
28 **section (8) of this section;**

29 **“(b) Specific funding under the department’s control; and**

30 **“(c) Specified assistance in pursuing other state or public funds.**

1       **“(8) Under the housing acceleration agreement, the city shall agree**  
2 **to:**

3       **“(a) If the department determines that the factors affecting housing**  
4 **production, affordability and choice are a consequence of policies and**

6 **housing production strategy within six months that includes:**

7       **“(A) A timeline for performance under ORS 197.290 (4) of no less**  
8 **than one year; and**

9       **“(B) Specified actions including, but not limited to:**

10       **“(i) Actions under ORS 197.290 (3);**

11       **“(ii) Dedicating funds for increased local capacity to facilitate**  
12 **housing production, affordability and choice;**

13       **“(iii) Dedicating funds for public facilities and infrastructure nec-**  
14 **essary to support housing production;**

15       **“(iv) Taking measures that increase the availability of**  
16 **development-ready land as described in section 23 of this 2023 Act;**

17       **“(v) Amending the development code, approval criteria or proce-**  
18 **dures to reduce cost or delay to housing production; and**

19       **“(vi) Taking emergency temporary measures to support housing**  
20 **production; and**

21       **“(b) Join any department initiated interagency mediation to identify**  
22 **policies and resources that would support housing production in the**  
23 **city.**

24       **“(9) The department may require that a city that is not required to**  
25 **adopt an amendment to its housing production strategy under sub-**  
26 **section (8)(a) of this section include findings at the time that the city**  
27 **is next required to adopt a housing production strategy under ORS**  
28 **197.290 (1) that describe how the city has addressed the audit’s findings**  
29 **and any suggested actions.**

30       **“(10) The department may grant limited extensions to deadlines**



1 **under subsections (3)(b) and (c) and (8)(a) of this section for emer-**  
2 **gencies, good cause or other factors outside of the city’s control.**

3 **“(11) The actions by a city or department under this section are not**  
4 **land use decisions and are not subject to appeal or review.**

5 **“(12) All public bodies, as defined in ORS 174.109, are directed to**  
6 **assist cities and the department in the performance of their duties**  
7 **under this section and to take timely action to ensure that the**  
8 **agency’s rules or policies do not unduly delay implementation of a**  
9 **housing acceleration agreement under this section.**

10 **“SECTION 15.** ORS 197.319 is amended to read:

11 **“197.319. (1) Before a person may request adoption of an enforcement or-**  
12 **der under ORS 197.320, the person shall:**

13 **“(a) Present the reasons, in writing, for such an order to the affected local**  
14 **government; and**

15 **“(b) Request:**

16 **“(A) Revisions to the local comprehensive plan, land use regulations,**  
17 **special district cooperative or urban service agreement or decision-making**  
18 **process which is the basis for the order; or**

19 **“(B) That an action be taken regarding the local comprehensive plan, land**  
20 **use regulations, special district agreement, housing production strategy or**  
21 **decision-making process that is the basis for the order.**

22 **“(2)(a) The local government or special district shall issue a written re-**  
23 **sponse to the request within 60 days of the date the request is mailed to the**  
24 **local government or special district.**

25 **“(b) The requestor and the local government or special district may enter**  
26 **into mediation to resolve issues in the request. The Department of Land**  
27 **Conservation and Development shall provide mediation services when jointly**

9 **complying with subsections (1) and (2) of this section. Notwithstanding**  
10 **ORS 183.635 (2) and 197.328 (1), the request under this subsection must**  
11 **be assigned to an administrative law judge appointed under ORS**  
12 **183.635 unless the commission has previously appointed a hearing of-**

20 an order requiring a local government, state agency or special district to  
21 take action necessary to bring its comprehensive plan, land use regulation,  
22 limited land use decisions or other land use decisions or actions into com-  
23 pliance with the goals, acknowledged comprehensive plan provisions, land  
24 use regulations, [or] housing production strategy **or housing acceleration**  
25 **agreements** if the commission has good cause to believe:

26 “(1) A comprehensive plan or land use regulation adopted by a local  
27 government not on a compliance schedule is not in compliance with the goals  
28 by the date set in ORS 197.245 or 197.250 for such compliance[;].

29 “(2) A plan, program, rule or regulation affecting land use adopted by a  
30 state agency or special district is not in compliance with the goals by the

1 date set in ORS 197.245 or 197.250 for such compliance[;].

2 “(3) A local government is not making satisfactory progress toward per-  
3 formance of its compliance schedule[;].

4 “(4) A state agency is not making satisfactory progress in carrying out  
5 its coordination agreement or the requirements of ORS 197.180[;].

6 “(5) A local government has no comprehensive plan or land use regulation  
7 and is not on a compliance schedule directed to developing the plan or  
8 regulation[;].

9 “(6) A local government has engaged in a pattern or practice of decision  
10 making that violates an acknowledged comprehensive plan or land use reg-  
11 ulation. In making its determination under this subsection, the commission  
12 shall determine whether there is evidence in the record to support the deci-  
13 sions made. The commission shall not judge the issue solely upon adequacy  
14 of the findings in support of the decisions[;].

15 “(7) A local government has failed to comply with a commission order  
16 entered under ORS 197.644[;].

17 “(8) A special district has engaged in a pattern or practice of decision-  
18 making that violates an acknowledged comprehensive plan or cooperative  
19 agreement adopted pursuant to ORS 197.020[;].

20 “(9) A special district is not making satisfactory progress toward per-  
21 formance of its obligations under ORS chapters 195 and 197[;].

22 “(10) A local government’s approval standards, special conditions on ap-  
23 proval of specific development proposals or procedures for approval do not  
24 comply with ORS 197.307 (4) or (6)[;].

25 “(11) A local government is not making satisfactory progress toward  
26 meeting its obligations under ORS 195.065[;].

27 “(12) A local government within the jurisdiction of a metropolitan service  
28 district has failed to make changes to the comprehensive plan or land use  
29 regulations to comply with the regional framework plan of the district or  
30 has engaged in a pattern or practice of decision-making that violates a re-

1 quirement of the regional framework plan[; or].

2 “(13) A city [*is not making satisfactory progress in taking actions listed in*  
3 *its housing production strategy under ORS 197.290.*] **with a population of**  
4 **10,000 or greater that:**

5 “(a) **Has a pattern or practice of violating housing-related statutes**  
6 **or implementing policies that create additional, unnecessary cost or**  
7 **delay to affordable or market-rate housing production;**

8 “(b) **Has a pattern or practice of creating adverse disparate impacts**  
9 **to state or federal protected classes or inhibiting equitable access to**  
10 **housing choice, as described in ORS 197.290 (2)(b) to (d);**

11 “(c) **Has failed to enter into a housing acceleration agreement as**  
12 **required under ORS 197.293 (6); or**

13 “(d) **Has materially breached a term of a housing acceleration**  
14 **agreement under ORS 197.293 (8), including a failure to meet the**  
15 **timeline for performance under ORS 197.293 (8)(a)(A).**

16 “**SECTION 17.** ORS 197.335 is amended to read:

17 “197.335. (1) An order issued under ORS 197.328 and the copy of the order  
18 mailed to the local government, state agency or special district [*shall*] **must**  
19 set forth:

20 “(a) The nature of the noncompliance, including, but not limited to, the  
21 contents of the comprehensive plan or land use regulation, if any, of a local  
22 government that do not comply with the goals or the contents of a plan,  
23 program or regulation affecting land use adopted by a state agency or special  
24 district that do not comply with the goals. In the case of a pattern or prac-

8  
9 **“SECTION 20. Sections 8, 13 and 21 to 23 of this 2023 Act are added**  
10 **to and made a part of ORS 197.286 to 197.314.**

11 **“SECTION 21. (1) This section applies only to cities that are not**  
12 **within Metro or described in section 22 (1) of this 2023 Act.**

13 **“(2) The actions required under subsection (3) of this section must**  
14 **be undertaken:**

15 **“(a) At periodic review pursuant to ORS 197.628 to 197.651;**

16 **“(b) On a schedule established by the Land Conservation and De-**  
17 **velopment Commission for cities with a population of 10,000 or greater,**  
18 **not to exceed once each eight years;**

19 **“(c) At any other legislative review of the comprehensive plan that**  
20 **requires the application of a statewide planning goal related to**  
21 **buildable lands for residential use; or**

22 **“(d) At the election of a city with a population of less than 10,000.**

23 **“(3) A city shall, according to rules of the commission:**

24 **“(a) Determine its needed housing under section 23 of this 2023 Act;**

25 **“(b) Inventory the supply of buildable lands available within the**  
26 **urban growth boundary to accommodate needed housing; and**

27 **“(c) Take any necessary actions described in ORS 197.290 (3),**  
28 **whether or not the actions are described within the city’s housing**  
29 **production strategy, to accommodate needed housing.**

30 **“SECTION 22. (1) This section applies only to local governments**

1 with jurisdiction over lands inside the urban growth boundary of:

2 “(a) Cities located outside Metro with a population of 25,000 or  
3 greater; and

4 “(b) Cities that meet factors established by Land Conservation and  
5 Development Commission in consideration of the city’s size, rate of  
6 population growth or proximity to another city with a population of  
7 25,000 or greater or to Metro.

8 “(2) A local government shall determine its needed housing under  
9 section 23 of this 2023 Act and inventory its buildable lands and de-  
10 termine the lands’ housing capacity under this section:

11 “(a) At periodic review under ORS 197.628 to 197.651;

12 “(b) As scheduled by the commission at least once each eight years;  
13 or

14 “(c) At any other legislative review of the comprehensive plan that  
15 concerns the urban growth boundary and requires the application of  
16 a statewide planning goal related to buildable lands for residential use.

17 “(3) For the purpose of determining housing capacity and inventory  
18 of buildable lands under subsection (2) of this section:

19 “(a) ‘Buildable lands’ includes:

20 “(A) Vacant lands planned or zoned for residential use;

21 “(B) Partially vacant lands planned or zoned for residential use;

22 “(C) Lands that may be used for a mix of residential and employ-  
23 ment uses under the existing planning or zoning; and

24 “(D) Lands that may be used for residential infill or redevelopment.

25 “(b) The local government shall consider:

26 “(A) The extent that residential development is prohibited or re-  
27 stricted by local regulation and ordinance, state law and rule or fed-  
28 eral statute and regulation;

29 “(B) A written long term contract or easement for radio, telecom-  
30 munications or electrical facilities, if the written contract or easement

1 is provided to the local government; and

2 “(C) The presence of a single family dwelling or other structure on  
3 a lot or parcel.

4 “(c) Except for land that may be used for residential infill or rede-  
5 velopment, the local government shall create a map or document that  
6 may be used to verify and identify specific lots or parcels that have  
7 been determined to be buildable lands.

8 “(4)(a) Except as provided in paragraphs (b) and (c) of this sub-  
9 section, the determination of housing capacity must be based on data  
10 related to land within the urban growth boundary that has been col-  
11 lected since the last review under subsection (2)(b) of this section. The  
12 data must include:

13 “(A) The number, density and average mix of housing types of ur-  
14 ban residential development that have actually been developed;

15 “(B) Trends in density and average mix of housing types of urban  
16 residential development;

17 “(C) Market factors that may substantially impact future urban  
18 residential development;

19 “(D) The number, density and average mix of housing types that  
20 have been developed on buildable lands;

21 “(E) Consideration of the effects of the adopted housing production  
22 strategy and measures taken and reasonably anticipated to be taken  
23 to implement the strategy; and

24 “(F) Consideration of factors that influence available housing sup-  
25 ply, including short-term rentals, second homes and vacation homes.

26 “(b) A local government shall make the determination described in  
27 paragraph (a) of this subsection using data from a shorter time period  
28 than the time period described in paragraph (a) of this subsection if  
29 the local government finds that the shorter time period will provide  
30 more accurate and reliable data related to housing capacity. The

1 shorter time period may not be less than three years.

2 “(c) A local government shall use data from a wider geographic area  
3 or use a time period longer than the time period described in para-  
4 graph (a) of this subsection if the analysis of a wider geographic area  
5 or the use of data from a longer time period will provide more accu-  
6 rate, complete and reliable data related to trends affecting housing  
7 need than an analysis performed pursuant to paragraph (a) of this  
8 subsection. The local government must clearly describe the geographic  
9 area, time frame and source of data used in a determination performed  
10 under this paragraph.

11 “(5) If the needed housing is greater than the housing capacity, the  
12 local government shall take one or both of the following actions to  
13 accommodate allocated housing need for the next 20 years:

14 “(a) Amend its urban growth boundary to include sufficient  
15 buildable lands to accommodate allocated housing need for the next  
16 20 years consistent with the requirements of ORS 197A.320 and state-  
17 wide planning goals. As part of this process, the local government  
18 shall consider the effects of actions taken pursuant to paragraph (b)  
19 of this subsection. The amendment must include sufficient land rea-  
20 sonably necessary to accommodate the siting of new public school fa-  
21 cilities. The need and inclusion of lands for new public school facilities  
22 must be a coordinated process between the affected public school dis-  
23 tricts and the local government that has the authority to approve the  
24 urban growth boundary.

25 “(b) Take any action under ORS 197.290 (3), whether or not the  
26 action was described in an approved housing production strategy, that  
27 demonstrably increases housing capacity or produces additional needed  
28 housing. Actions under this paragraph may include amending a com-  
29 prehensive plan or land use regulations to include new measures that  
30 demonstrably increase the likelihood that residential development will

1 occur at densities sufficient to accommodate needed housing for the  
2 next 20 years without expansion of the urban growth boundary.

3 “(6) A local government that takes any actions under subsection (5)  
4 of this section shall:

5 “(a) Demonstrate that the comprehensive plan and land use regu-  
6 lations comply with goals and rules adopted by the commission.

7 “(b) Adopt findings regarding the changes in housing capacity as-  
8 sumed to result from actions adopted based on data collected under  
9 subsection (4)(a) of this section. The density expectations may not  
10 project an increase in residential capacity above achieved density by  
11 more than three percent without quantifiable validation of such de-  
12 partures. A quantifiable validation must demonstrate that the as-  
13 sumed housing capacity has been achieved in areas that are zoned to  
14 allow no greater than the same authorized density level, as defined in  
15 ORS 227.175, within the local government’s jurisdiction or a jurisdic-  
16 tion in the same region.

17 “(c) In establishing that actions adopted under subsection (5) of this  
18 section demonstrably increase housing capacity, ensure that buildable  
19 lands are in locations appropriate for needed housing, are zoned at  
20 density ranges that are likely to be achieved by the housing market  
21 and are in areas where sufficient urban services are planned to enable  
22 the higher density development to occur over the 20-year period.

23 **“SECTION 23. (1) At the time that a city is required to inventory  
24 its buildable lands under ORS 197.297 (1) or section 21 or 22 of this 2023  
25 Act, the city shall determine its needed housing under this section.**

26 **“(2)(a) As used in this section, ‘needed housing’ means housing by  
27 affordability level, as described in section 2 (4) of this 2023 Act, type,  
28 characteristics and location that is necessary to accommodate the  
29 city’s allocated housing need over the 20-year planning period in effect  
30 when the city’s housing capacity is determined.**

1       **“(b) ‘Needed housing’ includes the following housing types:**  
2       **“(A) Detached single-family housing, middle housing types as de-**  
3 **scribed in ORS 197.758 and multifamily housing that is owned or**  
4 **rented;**  
5       **“(B) Government assisted housing;**  
6       **“(C) Mobile home or manufactured dwelling parks as provided in**  
7 **ORS 197.475 to 197.490;**  
8       **“(D) Manufactured homes on individual lots planned and zoned for**  
9 **single-family residential use that are in addition to lots within desig-**  
10 **nated manufactured dwelling subdivisions;**  
11       **“(E) Housing for agricultural workers;**  
12       **“(F) Housing for individuals with a variety of disabilities, related**  
13 **to mobility or communications that require accessibility features;**  
14       **“(G) Housing for older persons, as defined in ORS 659A.421; and**  
15       **“(H) Housing for college or university students, if relevant to the**  
16 **region.**  
17       **“(3) Subsection (2)(b)(A) and (D) of this section does not apply to:**  
18       **“(a) A city with a population of less than 2,500.**  
19       **“(b) A county with a population of less than 15,000.**  
20       **“(4) In determining needed housing the city must demonstrate that**  
21 **the projected housing types, characteristics and locations are:**  
22       **“(a) Attainable for the allocated housing need by income, including**  
23 **consideration of publicly supported housing;**

19       “[(i) *at least once each eight years for local governments that are not within*  
20 *a metropolitan service district; or*]

21       “[(ii)] at least once each six years [*for a metropolitan service district*]; or

22       “(C) At any other legislative review of the [*comprehensive plan or*] re-  
23 gional framework plan that concerns the urban growth boundary and re-  
24 quires the application of a statewide planning goal relating to buildable  
25 lands for residential use.

26       “(b) The 20-year period shall commence on the date initially scheduled for  
27 completion of the review under paragraph (a) of this subsection.

28       “(3) In performing the duties under subsection (2) of this section, [*a local*  
29 *government*] **Metro** shall:

30       “(a) Inventory the supply of buildable lands within the urban growth

1 boundary and determine the housing capacity of the buildable lands; and

2 “(b) Conduct an analysis of existing and projected housing need by type  
3 and density range, in accordance with all factors under ORS 197.303 and  
4 statewide planning goals and rules relating to housing, to determine the  
5 number of units and amount of land needed for each needed housing type for  
6 the next 20 years.

7 “(4)(a) For the purpose of the inventory described in subsection (3)(a) of  
8 this section, ‘buildable lands’ includes:

9 “(A) Vacant lands planned or zoned for residential use;

10 “(B) Partially vacant lands planned or zoned for residential use;

11 “(C) Lands that may be used for a mix of residential and employment uses  
12 under the existing planning or zoning; and

13 “(D) Lands that may be used for residential infill or redevelopment.

14 “(b) For the purpose of the inventory and determination of housing ca-  
15 pacity described in subsection (3)(a) of this section, [*the local government*]  
16 **Metro** must demonstrate consideration of:

17 “(A) The extent that residential development is prohibited or restricted  
18 by local regulation and ordinance, state law and rule or federal statute and  
19 regulation;

20 “(B) A written long term contract or easement for radio, telecommuni-  
21 cations or electrical facilities, if the written contract or easement is provided  
22 to [*the local government; and*] **Metro**;

23 “(C) The presence of a single family dwelling or other structure on a lot  
24 or parcel[.]; **and**

25 “(D) **Factors that influence available housing supply, including**  
26 **short-term rentals, second homes and vacation homes.**

27 “(c) Except for land that may be used for residential infill or redevelop-  
28 ment, [*a local government*] **Metro** shall create a map or document that may  
29 be used to verify and identify specific lots or parcels that have been deter-  
30 mined to be buildable lands.

1 “(5)(a) Except as provided in paragraphs (b) and (c) of this subsection, the  
2 determination of housing capacity pursuant to subsection (3)(a) of this sec-  
3 tion must be based on data relating to land within the urban growth  
4 boundary that has been collected since the last review under subsection  
5 (2)(a)(B) of this section. The data shall include:

6 “(A) The number, density and average mix of housing types of urban resi-  
7 dential development that have actually occurred;

8 “(B) Trends in density and average mix of housing types of urban resi-

10 “(C) Market factors that may substantially impact future urban residen-

12 “(D) The number, density and average mix of housing types that have

2 “(a) Amend its urban growth boundary to include sufficient buildable

2 *“[(C) Adopt measures necessary to accommodate the estimated housing*

4 *“[(c) The actions required under paragraph (b) of this subsection shall be*

6 *“[(A) At periodic review pursuant to ORS 197.628 to 197.651;]*

7 *“[(B) On a schedule established by the commission for cities with a popu-*  
8 *lation greater than 10,000, not to exceed once each eight years; or]*

9 *“[(C) At any other legislative review of the comprehensive plan that requires*  
10 *the application of a statewide planning goal relating to buildable lands for*

12 *“[(d) For the purpose of the inventory described in this subsection,*

19 ernmental agreement pursuant to ORS 190.003 to 190.130, 195.025 or 197.652  
20 to 197.658 to designate rural reserves pursuant to this section [*and*] **at the**  
21 **same time as designating** urban reserves pursuant to ORS 195.145 (1)[*(b)*].

22 “(2) Land designated as a rural reserve:

23 “(a) Must be outside an urban growth boundary.

24 “(b) May not be designated as an urban reserve during the urban reserve  
25 planning period described in ORS 195.145 (4).

26 “(c) May not be included within an urban growth boundary during the  
27 period of time described in paragraph (b) of this subsection.

28 “(3) When designating a rural reserve under this section to provide long-  
29 term protection to the agricultural industry, [*a county and a metropolitan*  
30 *service district shall base the designation*] **the designation must be based**

1 on consideration of factors including, but not limited to, whether land pro-

3 “195.145. (1) To ensure that the supply of land available for urbanization

23 “SECTION 40. ORS 195.033 is amended to read:

24 “195.033. (1) As used in this section, ‘affected local government’ means:

25 “(a) A city or county for which the Portland State University Population  
26 Research Center is preparing a population forecast;

27 “(b) A county that contains all or part of a city or an urban growth  
28 boundary for which the center is preparing a population forecast; and

29 “(c) A local service district, as defined in ORS 174.116, that includes ter-  
30 ritory within the area subject to the population forecast.

1       “(2) For the purpose of land use planning, the center shall issue a popu-  
2 lation forecast for:

3       “(a) Each county except Multnomah, Clackamas and Washington Coun-  
4 ties;

5       “(b) The portions of Multnomah, Clackamas and Washington Counties  
6 that are not within Metro; and

7       “(c) The area within each urban growth boundary other than the urban  
8 growth boundary of Metro.

9       “(3) A local government with land use jurisdiction over land for which  
10 the center issues population forecasts under subsection (2) of this section  
11 shall apply the current final population forecast when changing the com-  
12 prehensive plan or a land use regulation of the local government.

13       “(4) The center shall issue population forecasts for each area described  
14 in subsection (2) of this section not less than once every four years on a

- 1 “(f) Nonprofit organizations;
- 2 “(g) Homeless services providers;
- 3 “(h) Culturally specific organizations;
- 4 “(i) Housing providers;
- 5 “(j) Veterans’ services organizations; and
- 6 “(k) Other entities identified by the department by rule.

7 “(3) The policy under subsection (2) of this section shall direct that pro-  
8 gram funds shall be used:

9 “(a) To provide to low and very low income individuals, including but not  
10 limited to individuals more than 65 years of age, persons with disabilities,  
11 agricultural workers and Native Americans:

12 “(A) Emergency shelters and attendant services;

13 “(B) Transitional housing services designed to assist individuals to make  
14 the transition from homelessness to permanent housing and economic inde-

2 “(4)(a) The council shall require as a condition of awarding a grant that  
3 the organization demonstrate to the satisfaction of the council that the or-  
4 ganization:

5 “(A) Has the capacity to deliver any service proposed by the organization;

6 “(B) Is a culturally responsive organization or is engaged in a process to  
7 become a culturally responsive organization;

8 “(C) Engages with culturally specific organizations; and

9 “(D) Supports local homelessness system planning efforts.

10 “(b) Any funds granted under this section may not be used to replace ex-  
11 isting funds. Funds granted under this section may be used to supplement  
12 existing funds. An organization may use funds to support existing programs

26 cluding evidence-based and emerging practices for serving rural communities.

28 ORS 294.187 are dedicated to the emergency housing assistance program for  
29 assistance to veterans who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.

29 “(d) [*Unaccompanied homeless youth*] **‘Youth experiencing**  
30 **homelessness’** means a person who is:

1 “(A) At least 16 years of age but not more than 21 years of age;

2 “(B) Not in the physical custody of a parent or legal guardian;

3 “(C) Not in the custody of the Department of Human Services;

4 “(D) Not a ward of the state; and

5 “(E) Homeless.

6 “(2) In addition to and not in lieu of any other scholarships or grants, the  
7 department may award two-year grants to organizations that operate host  
8 home projects for [*unaccompanied homeless*] youth **experiencing**

6 possession that is based on a termination notice for nonpayment if the

23 and sections 5 to 11, chapter 424, Oregon Laws 2007, and sections 2 to 9 and  
24 17, chapter 855, Oregon Laws 2009, and sections 2 to 7, chapter 8, Oregon  
25 Laws 2010:

26 “(1) ‘Acquisition date’ means the date described in ORS 195.328.

21       “(b) The purchaser under a land sale contract, if there is a recorded land

4 “(4) ‘Commission’ means the Land Conservation and Development Com-

6 “(5) ‘Comprehensive plan’ means a generalized, coordinated land use map  
7 and policy statement of the governing body of a local government that  
8 interrelates all functional and natural systems and activities relating to the  
9 use of lands, including but not limited to sewer and water systems, trans-

6 “(11) ‘Land use regulation’ means any local government zoning ordinance,  
7 land division ordinance adopted under ORS 92.044 or 92.046 or similar gen-  
8 eral ordinance establishing standards for implementing a comprehensive  
9 plan.

10 “(12) ‘Limited land use decision’:

11 “(a) Means a final decision or determination made by a local government  
12 pertaining to a site within an urban growth boundary that concerns:

13 “(A) The approval or denial of a tentative subdivision or partition plan,  
14 as described in ORS 92.040 (1).

15 “(B) The approval or denial of an application based on discretionary  
16 standards designed to regulate the physical characteristics of a use permitted  
17 outright, including but not limited to site review and design review.

18 “(b) Does not mean a final decision made by a local government pertain-  
19 ing to a site within an urban growth boundary that concerns approval or  
20 denial of a final subdivision or partition plat or that determines whether a  
21 final subdivision or partition plat substantially conforms to the tentative  
22 subdivision or partition plan.

23 “(13) ‘Local government’ means any city, county or [*metropolitan service*  
24 *district formed under ORS chapter 268*] **Metro** or an association of local  
25 governments performing land use planning functions under ORS 195.025.

28 “(15) ‘Metro planning goals and objectives’ means the land use goals and  
29 objectives that [*a metropolitan service district*] **Metro** may adopt under ORS

16 recent determination and analysis pursuant to subsection (5) of this section,  
17 concludes that an expansion of its urban growth boundary is warranted, [*the*  
18 *metropolitan service district*] **Metro** may take action to expand its urban  
19 growth boundary in one or more locations to accommodate the proposed de-  
20 velopment, provided the urban growth boundary expansion does not exceed  
21 a total of 1,000 acres.  
22 “(b) [*A metropolitan service district that*] **If Metro** expands its urban  
23 growth boundary under this subsection, **Metro**:

23 “(A) Will have within its boundaries sufficient buildable lands and other  
24 development capacity, including land and capacity for needed housing and  
25 employment opportunities, to meet the growth in population and employment  
26 forecast to occur over a 14-year period.

27 “(B) Will not become less efficient in its use of land as a result of a  
28 change to the urban growth boundary.

29 “(b) The urban population per square mile will continue to increase over  
30 time on a statewide basis and in major regions of the state, including that

1 portion of the Willamette Valley outside of Metro.

2 “(c) The rate of conversion of agricultural and forest lands to urban uses  
3 does not increase over time in any major region of the state.

4 “(3) Under the method adopted by the commission:

5 “(a) A city’s determination of the amount of buildable lands [*needed for*]  
6 **sufficient for needed** housing, employment and other urban uses must be  
7 based on the population and employment growth forecast to occur over a  
8 14-year period.

9 “(b) A city’s determination of the supply and development capacity of  
10 lands within its urban growth boundary must be based on:

11 “(A) An inventory of vacant and partially vacant buildable lands within  
12 the urban growth boundary;

13 “(B) The comprehensive plan designation and the zoning of the portion  
14 of the buildable lands that is urban; and

15 “(C) Factors established by the commission for forecasting:

16 “(i) The development and redevelopment capacity of urbanizable lands  
17 within the urban growth boundary; and

18 “(ii) The redevelopment capacity of developed urban lands within the ur-  
19 ban growth boundary.

20 “(c) A city’s determination of the supply and development capacity of  
21 lands the city proposes to include within the urban growth boundary must  
22 be based on:

23 “(A) An inventory of vacant and partially vacant lands; and

24 “(B) Factors established by the commission for forecasting the develop-  
25 ment and redevelopment capacity of the lands.

26 “(d) A city shall consider a range or combination of measures identified  
27 by rule of the commission to accommodate future need for land within the  
28 urban growth boundary and implement at least one measure or satisfy an  
29 alternate performance standard established by the commission. The commis-  
30 sion shall design the alternate performance standard so that the standard is

1 satisfied when the city:

2 “(A) Has a development code that contains specified provisions designed  
3 to encourage the development of needed housing; and

4 “(B) Demonstrates that, during the preceding planning period, the city:

5 “(i) If located in the Willamette Valley, exceeded the median rate of re-  
6 development and infill for cities with a population of 10,000 or [more]  
7 **greater** in the Willamette Valley that are outside of the boundaries of Metro  
8 by an amount set by commission rule; and

9 “(ii) If located outside of the Willamette Valley, exceeded the median rate  
10 of redevelopment and infill for cities with a population of 10,000 or [more]  
11 **greater** that are outside the Willamette Valley by an amount set by com-  
12 mission rule.

13 “(e) A city shall demonstrate that lands included within the urban growth  
14 boundary:

15 “(A) Include sufficient serviceable land for at least a seven-year period.

16 “(B) Can all be serviceable over a 14-year period.

17 “(f) Lands included within the urban growth boundary:

18 “(A) Must be planned and zoned for categories of land uses in amounts  
19 that are roughly proportional to the land need determined for each category  
20 of use;

21 “(B) Must be planned and zoned for an intensity of use that is generally  
22 consistent with the estimates that were used to determine the amount of land  
23 needed;

24 “(C) Must be planned and zoned to meet the requirements for needed  
25 housing, and those requirements must be specified by rule of the commission  
26 in a manner that is as objective as practicable; and

27 “(D) May be either:

28 “(i) Planned and zoned, or otherwise conditioned, to avoid significantly  
29 affecting a state highway, a state highway interchange or a freight route  
30 designated in the Oregon Highway Plan; or



1       “(ii) Allowed to significantly affect a state highway, a state highway  
2 interchange or a freight route designated in the Oregon Highway Plan sub-  
3 ject to mitigation, consistent with rules of the commission, if the lands are  
4 planned and zoned for compact urban development or industrial uses.

5       “(4) For purposes of subsection (3)(a) of this section, population growth  
6 must be forecast as provided in ORS 195.033. Employment growth must be  
7 forecast based on the population growth forecast for the city or the employ-  
8 ment growth forecast issued by the Employment Department for the county  
9 or region. The commission shall establish factors, by rule, for converting the  
10 forecasted population and employment growth into forecasts of land need for  
11 housing, employment and other categories of uses. The factors must:

12       “(a) Be based on an empirical evaluation of the relation between popu-  
13 lation and employment growth and the rate and trends of land utilization in  
14 the recent past in the applicable major region of the state;

15       “(b) Reflect consideration by the commission of any significant changes  
16 occurring or expected to occur in the markets for urban land uses in that  
17 major region of the state;

18       “(c) Be designed to encourage an increase in the land use efficiency of a  
19 city, subject to market conditions; and

20       “(d) Provide a range of policy choices for a city about the form of its fu-  
21 ture growth.

22       “(5) For purposes of subsection (3)(b) of this section, the commission shall  
23 establish factors for supply and development capacity that are:

24       “(a) Based on an empirical evaluation of the population and employment  
25 growth that has occurred on similarly situated lands through development  
26 and redevelopment;

27       “(b) Based on consideration by the commission of any significant changes  
28 occurring or expected to occur in the markets for urban land uses in that  
29 major region of the state;

30       “(c) Designed to encourage an increase in the land use efficiency of the

1 city, subject to market conditions; and

2 “(d) Designed to provide a range of policy choices for a city about the  
3 form of its future growth.

4 “(6) For purposes of subsection (3)(c) of this section, the commission shall  
5 establish factors that are:

6 “(a) Based on an empirical evaluation of the population and employment  
7 growth that has occurred on similarly situated lands through development  
8 and redevelopment;

9 “(b) Based on consideration by the commission of any significant changes  
10 occurring or expected to occur in the markets for urban land uses in each  
11 major region of the state;

12 “(c) Designed to encourage an increase in the land use efficiency of the  
13 city, subject to market conditions; and

14 “(d) Designed to provide a range of policy choices for a city about the  
15 form of its future growth.

16 “(7) For lands that are included within an urban growth boundary pur-  
17 suant to this section and not made serviceable within 20 years after the date  
18 of their inclusion, the commission may provide by rule that:

19 “(a) The lands must be removed from within the urban growth boundary  
20 the next time the city evaluates the urban growth boundary; or

21 “(b) The planned development capacity of the lands must be reduced if

23 “(8) When lands included within the urban growth boundary pursuant to  
24 this section are planned and zoned for industrial or residential uses, the  
25 lands must remain planned and zoned for the use unless a rule of the com-

30 **“SECTION 97. Any moneys remaining in the City Economic Devel-**

1 **opment Pilot Program Fund on the effective date of this 2023 Act that**  
2 **are unexpended, unobligated and not subject to any conditions shall**

4 **“SECTION 98.** ORS 215.457 is amended to read:

5 “215.457. A person may establish a youth camp:

6 “(1) On land zoned for forest use or mixed farm and forest use, consistent  
7 with rules adopted by the Land Conservation and Development Commission.

8 “(2) On land in eastern Oregon, as defined in ORS 321.805, that is zoned  
9 for exclusive farm use and is composed predominantly of class VI, VII or  
10 VIII soils, consistent with rules adopted by the Land Conservation and De-

12 authorized under this subsection within an irrigation district or within three

17 “215.501. (1) As used in this section:

18 “(a) ‘Accessory dwelling unit’ means a residential structure that is used

20 “(b) ‘Area zoned for rural residential use’ means land that is not located  
21 inside an urban growth boundary as defined in ORS [195.060] **197.015** and  
22 that is subject to an acknowledged exception to a statewide land use plan-  
23 ning goal relating to farmland or forestland and planned and zoned by the  
24 county to allow residential use as a primary use.

25 “(c) ‘Historic home’ means a single-family dwelling constructed between  
26 1850 and 1945.

27 “(d) ‘New’ means that the dwelling being constructed did not previously

30 sory dwelling unit.

1 “(5) A county may impose additional conditions of approval for con-  
2 struction of a new single-family dwelling or conversion of a historic home  
3 to an accessory dwelling unit under this section.

4 **“SECTION 100.** ORS 270.005 is amended to read:

5 “270.005. For purposes of ORS 184.634, 270.005 to 270.015, 270.100 to  
6 270.190, 273.416, 273.426 to 273.436 and 273.551:

7 “(1) ‘Department’ means the Oregon Department of Administrative Ser-  
8 vices.

9 “(2) ‘Improvements’ means any and all structures on or attachments to  
10 state-owned real property, but excluding public improvements as defined in  
11 ORS 279A.010.

12 “(3) ‘Real property’ means all real property together with any and all  
13 improvements thereon.

14 “(4) ‘Rural community’ means an unincorporated community that consists  
15 primarily of permanent residential dwellings but also has at least two other  
16 land uses that provide commercial, industrial or public uses to the commu-  
17 nity, the surrounding rural area or persons traveling through the area.

26 **“SECTION 101.** ORS 466.055 is amended to read:

27 “466.055. Before issuing a permit for a new facility designed to dispose  
28 of or treat hazardous waste or PCB, the Environmental Quality Commission  
29 must find, on the basis of information submitted by the applicant, the De-  
30 partment of Environmental Quality or any other interested party, that the

1 proposed facility meets the following criteria:

2 “(1) The proposed facility location:

3 “(a) Is suitable for the type and amount of hazardous waste or PCB in-  
4 tended for treatment or disposal at the facility;

5 “(b) Provides the maximum protection possible to the public health and  
6 safety and environment of Oregon from release of the hazardous waste or  
7 PCB stored, treated or disposed of at the facility; and

8 “(c) Is situated sufficient distance from urban growth boundaries, as de-  
9 fined in ORS [197.286] **197.015**, to protect the public health and safety, ac-  
10 cessible by transportation routes that minimize the threat to the public  
11 health and safety and to the environment and sufficient distance from parks,  
12 wilderness and recreation areas to prevent adverse impacts on the public use  
13 and enjoyment of those areas.

14 “(2) Subject to any applicable standards adopted under ORS 466.035, the  
15 design of the proposed facility:

16 “(a) Allows for treatment or disposal of the range of hazardous waste or  
17 PCB as required by the commission; and

18 “(b) Significantly adds to:

19 “(A) The range of hazardous waste or PCB handled at a treatment or  
20 disposal facility currently permitted under ORS 466.005 to 466.385; or

21 “(B) The type of technology employed at a treatment or disposal facility  
22 currently permitted under ORS 466.005 to 466.385.

23 “(3) The proposed facility uses the best available technology for treating  
24 or disposing of hazardous waste or PCB as determined by the department or  
25 the United States Environmental Protection Agency.

26 “(4) The need for the facility is demonstrated by:

27 “(a) Lack of adequate current treatment or disposal capacity in Oregon,  
28 Washington, Idaho and Alaska to handle hazardous waste or PCB generated  
29 by Oregon companies;

30 “(b) A finding that operation of the proposed facility would result in a

1 higher level of protection of the public health and safety or environment; or

2 “(c) Significantly lower treatment or disposal costs to Oregon companies.

3 “(5) The proposed hazardous waste or PCB treatment or disposal facility  
4 has no major adverse effect on either:

5 “(a) Public health and safety; or

6 “(b) Environment of adjacent lands.

7 **“SECTION 102.** ORS 527.755 is amended to read:

8 “527.755. (1) The following highways are hereby designated as scenic  
9 highways for purposes of the Oregon Forest Practices Act:

10 “(a) Interstate Highways 5, 84, 205, 405; and

11 “(b) State Highways 6, 7, 20, 18/22, 26, 27, 30, 31, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 58, 62,  
12 66, 82, 97, 101, 126, 138, 140, 199, 230, 234 and 395.

13 “(2) The purpose of designating scenic highways is to provide a limited  
14 mechanism that maintains roadside trees for the enjoyment of the motoring  
15 public while traveling through forestland, consistent with ORS 527.630,  
16 safety and other practical considerations.

17 “(3) The State Board of Forestry, in consultation with the Department of  
18 Transportation, shall establish procedures and regulations as necessary to  
19 implement the requirements of subsections (4), (5) and (6) of this section,  
20 consistent with subsection (2) of this section, including provisions for alter-  
21 nate plans. Alternate plans that modify or waive the requirements of sub-  
22 section (4), (5) or (6) of this section may be approved when, in the judgment  
23 of the State Forester, circumstances exist such as:

24 “(a) Modification or waiver is necessary to maintain motorist safety,

8 “(b) Overstory trees initially required to be left under paragraph (a) of  
9 this subsection may be removed when the reproduction understory reaches  
10 an average height of at least 10 feet and has at least the minimum number  
11 of stems per acre of free to grow seedlings or saplings required by the board  
12 for reforestation, by rule.

13 “(c) Alternatively, when the adjacent stand, extending from 150 feet from  
14 the outermost edge of the roadway to 300 feet from the outermost edge of the  
15 roadway, has attained an average height of at least 10 feet and has at least  
16 the minimum number of stems per acre of free to grow seedlings or saplings  
17 required by the board for reforestation, by rule, or at least 40 square feet  
18 of basal area per acre, no trees are required to be left in the visually sensi-  
19 tive corridor, or trees initially required to be left under paragraph (a) of this  
20 subsection may be removed. When harvests within the visually sensitive  
21 corridor are carried out under this paragraph, the adjacent stand, extending  
22 from 150 feet from the outermost edge of the roadway to 300 feet from the  
23 outermost edge of the roadway, shall not be reduced below the minimum  
24 number of stems per acre of free to grow seedlings or saplings at least 10 feet  
25 tall required by the board for reforestation, by rule, or below 40 square feet  
26 of basal area per acre until the adjacent visually sensitive corridor has been  
27 reforested as required under subsection (6) of this section and the stand has  
28 attained an average height of at least 10 feet and has at least the minimum  
29 number of stems per acre.

30 “(5) Harvest areas within a visually sensitive corridor shall be cleared



1 of major harvest debris within 30 days of the completion of the harvest, or  
2 within 60 days of the cessation of active harvesting activity on the site, re-  
3 gardless of whether the harvest operation is complete.

4 “(6) Notwithstanding the time limits established in ORS 527.745 (1)(a),

25 the Department of Land Conservation and Development shall approve an  
26 expansion of the urban growth boundary submitted by the city and approved  
27 by the city by ordinance, if the department determines that:

8 “**SECTION 104.** Section 9, chapter 552, Oregon Laws 2021, is amended to  
9 read:

10 “**Sec. 9.** (1) Notwithstanding ORS 197.250 or 197.612 or any statewide land  
11 use planning goal, the Department of Land Conservation and Development  
12 shall approve Stevens Road planning amendments provided the department  
13 determines, in its discretion, that the Stevens Road planning amendments,  
14 with respect to the Stevens Road tract, include:

15 “(a) An inventory of significant historical artifacts, cultural sites and  
16 natural resources.

17 “(b) Areas designated for recreational and open space.

18 “(c) Land use regulations for the protection and preservation of signif-  
19 icant resources and designated areas identified in paragraphs (a) and (b) of  
20 this subsection.

21 “(d) Land use regulations that comply with applicable wildfire planning  
22 and development requirements, including requirements in regulations  
23 adopted to implement a statewide planning goal relating to natural disasters  
24 and hazards.

25 “(e) Areas designated for adequate employment lands that account for the  
26 city’s most recent economic opportunity analysis, including consideration of  
27 subsequent economic development activities and trends.

28 “(f) Within areas zoned for residential purposes, without counting the  
29 lands designated under subsection (2) of this section, land use regulations for  
30 housing that:

1 “(A) Ensure adequate opportunities for the development of all needed  
2 housing types, sizes and densities of market-rate housing, including middle  
3 housing as defined in ORS 197.758;

4 “(B) Exceed the proportions of single-family attached and multifamily  
5 housing called for in the city’s most recently adopted housing needs analysis  
6 under ORS 197.296 (3) **(2021 Edition)**;

7 “(C) Exceed a minimum density standard of nine residential units per  
8 gross residential acre; and

9 “(D) On the date the Stevens Road planning amendments are approved,  
10 comply with land use regulations adopted by the city, or any minimum ap-  
11 plicable rules adopted by the department, to implement ORS 197.758 and the  
12 amendments to ORS 197.312 by section 7, chapter 639, Oregon Laws 2019.

13 “(g) Sufficient areas designated for mixed use development to support and  
14 integrate viable commercial and residential uses along with transportation  
15 options, including walking, bicycling and transit use.

16 “(h) Land use regulations ensuring that:

17 “(A) Adequate capacity is available, or feasible with development, for  
18 water, sewer and storm water services; and

19 “(B) Adequate consideration is given to the financing, scheduling and  
20 development of urban services, as defined in ORS 195.065.

21 “(i) Land use regulations for transportation that:

22 “(A) Ensure the development of adequate infrastructure to support walk-  
23 ing, bicycling, public transit and motor vehicle movement; and

24 “(B) Give adequate consideration to transportation networks that connect  
25 the Stevens Road tract to other areas within the urban growth boundary of  
26 the city.

27 “(j) The adequate consideration of the recommendations and comments  
28 received under section 8 (3) to (5), **chapter 552, Oregon Laws 2021** [*of this*  
29 *2021 Act*].

30 “(2) The department may not approve the planning amendments under

1 subsection (1) of this section unless the planning amendments designate at  
2 least 20 net acres of land to be:

3 “(a) Restricted so the area may be zoned, planned, sited or developed only  
4 for residential housing units at a minimum density of nine residential units  
5 per gross acre;

6 “(b) Conveyed to the city at a price per acre established under section 4  
7 (2)(b), **chapter 552, Oregon Laws 2021** [*of this 2021 Act*]; and

8 “(c) Notwithstanding ORS 91.225 or 197.309, preserved for a period of no  
9 less than 50 years as affordable to own or rent as follows:

10 “(A) At least 12 net acres made affordable to:

11 “(i) Households with incomes of 60 percent or less of the area median  
12 income, as defined in ORS 456.270; or

13 “(ii) If part of an income-averaging program approved by the Housing and  
14 Community Services Department, households whose incomes average 60 per-  
15 cent or less of the area median income.

16 “(B) At least six net acres:

17 “(i) Made affordable to households with incomes of 80 percent or less of  
18 the area median income; and

19 “(ii) Made available, to the extent permitted by law, in a manner that  
20 gives a priority to households in which at least one individual is employed  
21 by an education provider over other members of the public.

22 “(C) At least two net acres in which at least 80 percent of the units in  
23 each contiguous development tract are made affordable to households with  
24 80 percent or less of the area median income, of which at least one net acre  
25 is made available, to the extent permitted by law, in a manner that gives a  
26 priority to households in which at least one individual is employed by an  
27 education provider over other members of the public.

28 “(3) Upon a partition or subdivision of the Stevens Road tract following  
29 the approval of the planning amendments under subsection (1) of this section  
30 establishing one or more lots or parcels described in subsection (2) of this

1 section, the owner shall transfer those lots or parcels to the city. For a pe-  
2 riod of 99 years after the purchase of property under this section, if the city  
3 resells any lot or parcel, the city may recover only the city’s costs of the
