Shovel Ready Projects \$85.4 Million

Used the OHSU-PSU Gap Analysis 2023, OHA's Behavioral Health Housing and Residential Treatment Dashboard data, and the OHA Residential+ Study to create a rubric using the following metrics to determine funding.

- High priority regions based on service level gaps
- Anticipated capacity by county for current housing and residential treatment investments (beds/capita per 1,000 people)
- Co-located services
- Project Type
- Readiness
- Matching funds

Community Restoration \$7.5 Million

Community restoration fund resources to serve individuals who have been found to be unable to aid and assist in their own defense. Given the number of individuals in this population who have co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders and the rising caseloads seen in communities across the state, this behavioral health funding is critical to providing treatment to individual suffering from addiction.

Access to Medication Assisted Treatment \$10 Million

HB 4002 creates a program to provide MAT in jails across the state.

Behavioral Health Workforce

United We Health \$4.8 Million

SB 1594 establishes a behavioral health training trust to provide apprenticeships to increase the behavioral health workforce.

Higher Education Funding for Behavioral Health Training \$4 Million

SB 1592 allocates funding to each of the six public universities in Oregon for behavioral health workforce education.

Prevention

ODE Curriculum \$1.99 Million

ODE has been collaborating with Oregon Health Authority and the Alcohol Drug Policy Commission about how to best implement the requirements of Senate Bill 238 to provide develop curricula supplements related to the dangers of synthetic opioids, including fentanyl or any substituted derivative of fentanyl, and good Samaritan laws for the 24-25 school year.

Deflection

Deflection programs are funded in two ways, direct funding to community mental health programs for the behavioral health services required for deflection and IMPACTS grant funding for counties. For the counties who committed to setting up a deflection program, they will get a portion of the IMPACTs funds up front as a direct allocation.

- Community Mental Health Program funding through the county contracts for behavioral health services related to deflection and diversion \$9.83 Million
- Funding for Oregon Behavioral Health Deflection Program in CJC \$20.71 Million

Public Safety Investments

HB 4002 has off-ramps within it every step of the way that can provide an individual access to treatment and services. The following recommendations are to bolster those systems within the framework of HB 4002 and existing off-ramps.

Specialty Courts \$12.16 Million

• HB 4001 creates a taskforce to ensure the sustainability and effectiveness of our current specialty court system.

- A \$8,190,000 investment into CJC's specialty court programs will fill the gap between courts that applied for funding and the funding that is available.
- A \$3,970,000 investment to OJD will fund additional court coordinators that provide stability and coordination for local courts and their partners.

Funding for the community corrections system \$16 Million

Public Defense Attorney Capacity \$12.19 Million

Public Defense Workforce \$2.06 Million

Law school clinics

Associated Agency Administrative Investments \$7.56 million

\$2.96 million for OJD costs related to crime statute changes

\$3.45 million for CJC to implement deflection grant program and inter-agency coordination, Forensic Lab testing
