SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure. The statement includes a measure digest written in compliance with applicable readability standards.

Digest: The Act makes certain changes to a program for planned fires. The Act directs an agency to extend the deadline for a grant program for protecting homes from fire. The Act directs agencies to report on creating a program for protecting homes from fire. (Flesch Readability Score: 70.8).

Makes certain changes to the Prescribed Fire Liability Pilot Program.

Directs the Department of Consumer and Business Services to allow a person to apply for a grant under the Fire Hardening Grant Program on or before December 31, 2025.

Directs the Department of Consumer and Business Services and the Department of the State Fire Marshal to report, on or before September 15, 2024, to committees or interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to natural resources on a proposal for a proactive home hardening program.

[Establishes the Smoke Preparedness and Response Fund in the State Treasury. Continuously appropriates moneys in the fund to the Department of Environmental Quality for assistance with community smoke response plans.]

Takes effect on the 91st day following adjournment sine die.

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6	PRESCRIBED FIRE LIABILITY PILOT PROGRAM
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8	SECTION 1. Section 14, chapter 611, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to read:
9	Sec. 14. (1) As used in this section:
10	(a) "Cultural burn" means the intentional application of fire to land by an Indian tribe or cul-
11	tural fire practitioner to achieve cultural goals or objectives identified by a tribal ordinance, tradi-
12	tional tribal custom or law of an Indian tribe, such as subsistence, ceremonial activities, biodiversity
13	or other benefits.
14	(b) "Cultural fire practitioner" means a person associated with an Indian tribe with experience
15	in burning to meet cultural goals or objectives, including subsistence, ceremonial activities,
16	biodiversity or other benefits.
17	(c) "Indian tribe" means a federally recognized Indian tribe in Oregon.

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(2) The State Forestry Department shall establish a Prescribed Fire Liability Pilot Program and 1 2 administer the program. (3) Notwithstanding subsection (2) of this section, the Department of Consumer and Business 3 Services shall administer reimbursements for claims under the program. 4 5 (4) The program must be administered to: (a) Increase the pace and scale of the use of prescribed fire and cultural burning. 6 (b) Reduce barriers for conducting prescribed fires and cultural burning. 7 (c) Support coverage for losses from prescribed fires and cultural burning by nonpublic entities 8 9 such as cultural fire practitioners, private landowners, nongovernmental entities, Certified Burn Managers as defined in ORS 526.005, companies, contractors and operators. 10 (d) Support nonpublic entities, such as cultural fire practitioners, private landowners, nongov-11 12 ernmental entities, Certified Burn Managers, companies, contractors and operators, that are alleged 13to have caused damages resulting from prescribed fires or cultural burning. 21	468A.836. (1) The Department of Environmental Quality shall establish and implement a program
22	to support communities across this state in monitoring, interpreting and communicating data related
23	to ambient air quality conditions caused by [wildfire] smoke.
24	(2) As part of the program, the department shall:
25	(a) Conduct community outreach in areas of this state that are prone to poor air quality at-
26	tributable to [elevated levels of particulate matter] smoke events.
27	(b) Deploy air quality monitoring equipment in a manner sufficient to evaluate [an increased
28	prevalence of poor air quality attributable to elevated levels of particulate matter] smoke events.
29	(c) Monitor meteorological conditions in a manner sufficient to forecast [occurrences of poor air
30	quality] smoke impacts.
