

HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 5201

By JOINT COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

2 and insert “creating new provisions; amending section 8, chapter 111, Oregon Laws 2022, sections
3 1, 2 and 11, chapter 596, Oregon Laws 2023, and sections 21, 33, 44 and 45, chapter 599, Oregon
4 Laws 2023; repealing sections 24 and 32, chapter 599, Oregon Laws 2023; and declaring an emer-
5 gency.”.

6 Delete lines 5 through 23 and insert:

44 “Sec. 8. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2023, at the request of the Oregon Department
45 of Administrative Services, after the department consults with the McKenzie River Discovery Cen-

1 ter, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585
2 in an amount that produces \$3 million in net proceeds for the purposes described in subsection (2)
3 of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay
4 bond-related costs.

5 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the depart-
6 ment for deposit in the ODAS Economic Development Distributions Fund established under ORS
7 461.553 for distribution to the McKenzie River Discovery Center to [*construct a central exhibition*
8 *structure*] **restore, renovate, remodel or rebuild several historic buildings to create exhibition**
9 **space** and undertake site improvements at the site of the Historic Old Leaburg Fish Hatchery.

10 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs, fur-
11 ther economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks, beaches,
12 watersheds and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that the [*central ex-*
13 *hibition structure*] **new exhibition space** and site improvements will enhance the economic viability
14 of the region through increased tourism, job creation and improved quality of life for the community.

15 “**SECTION 4.** Section 33, chapter 599, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to read:

16 “**Sec. 33.** (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, at the request of the Oregon Department
17 of Administrative Services, after the department consults with the Department of Transportation,
18 the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in
19 an amount that produces \$20 million in net proceeds for the purposes described in subsection (2) of
20 this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay
21 bond-related costs.

22 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the Depart-
23 ment of Transportation for deposit in the DOT Economic Development Distributions Fund estab-
24 lished under ORS 461.557, for distribution to the [*Port of Hood River*] **Hood River-White Salmon**
25 **Bridge Authority** to support the Hood River-White Salmon Interstate Bridge replacement project.

26 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs, fur-
27 ther economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks, beaches,
28 watersheds and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that a safe, efficient
29 and reliable transportation infrastructure supports the long-term economic development and
30 livability of this state.

31 “**SECTION 5.** Section 44, chapter 599, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to read:

32 “**Sec. 44.** (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, at the request of the Oregon Department
33 of Administrative Services, after the department consults with the Oregon Business Development
34 Department, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to
35 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$20 million in net proceeds for the purposes described in sub-
36 section (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be neces-
37 sary to pay bond-related costs.

38 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the Oregon
39 Business Development Department for deposit in the Coos Bay Channel Fund established by section
40 15, chapter 746, Oregon Laws 2007, for distribution to the Oregon International Port of Coos Bay
41 to deepen and widen the Coos Bay Federal Navigation Channel **and for the design, engineering,**
42 **permitting and land acquisition efforts related to the Pacific Coast Intermodal Port project.**

43 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs, fur-
44 ther economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks, beaches,
45 watersheds and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that port facilities

1 and related infrastructure are an integral part of the commercial and industrial infrastructure of
2 this state, and promote economic development.

3 **“SECTION 6.** Section 45, chapter 599, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to read:

4 **“Sec. 45.** (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, at the request of the Oregon Department
5 of Administrative Services, after the department consults with the Oregon Business Development
6 Department, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to
7 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$20 million in net proceeds for the purposes described in sub-
8 section (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be neces-
9 sary to pay bond-related costs.

10 **“(2)** Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the Oregon
11 Business Development Department for deposit in the Coos Bay Channel Fund established by section
12 15, chapter 746, Oregon Laws 2007, for distribution to the Oregon International Port of Coos Bay
13 to deepen and widen the Coos Bay Federal Navigation Channel **and for the design, engineering,**
14 **permitting and land acquisition efforts related to the Pacific Coast Intermodal Port project.**

15 **“(3)** The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs, fur-
16 ther economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks, beaches,
17 watersheds and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that port facilities
18 and related infrastructure are an integral part of the commercial and industrial infrastructure of
19 this state, and promote economic development.

20 **“SECTION 7.** Section 21, chapter 599, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to read:

21 **“Sec. 21.** (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, at the request of the Oregon Department
22 of Administrative Services, after the department consults with the Oregon Business Development
23 Department, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to
24 286A.585 in an amount that produces [*\$5 million*] **\$9 million** in net proceeds for the purposes de-
25 scribed in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer
26 to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

27 **“(2)** Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the Oregon
28 Business Development Department for deposit in the OBDD Economic Development Distributions
29 Fund established under section 28, chapter 748, Oregon Laws 2017, for distribution to the City of
30 Aumsville to build a [*mechanical processing wastewater treatment plant*] **wastewater treatment**
31 **plant and increase the capacity of several segments of the gravity collection sewer system.**

32 **“(3)** The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs, fur-
33 ther economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks, beaches,
34 watersheds and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that wastewater
35 treatment systems **and related sewer infrastructure** are an integral part of the commercial and
36 industrial infrastructure of this state, and improving wastewater treatment will promote economic
37 development and watershed health.

38 **“SECTION 8.** Sections 24 and 32, chapter 599, Oregon Laws 2023, are repealed.

39 **“SECTION 9.** (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2025, at the request of the Oregon
40 Department of Administrative Services, after the department consults with Parrott Creek
41 Child and Family Services, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant
42 to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$4 million in net proceeds for the
43 purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by
44 the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

45 **“(2)** Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the

1 department for deposit in the ODAS Economic Development Distributions Fund established
2 under ORS 461.553, for distribution to Parrott Creek Child and Family Services for con-
3 struction of a youth residential treatment campus in Clackamas County.

4 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs,
5 further economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks,
6 beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that
7 individuals increase their potential for self-sufficiency, increase their economic productivity
8 and use fewer public resources when they have access to treatment programs and services.

9 “SECTION 10. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2025, at the request of the Oregon
10 Department of Administrative Services, after the department consults with the Family
11 YMCA of Marion and Polk Counties, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds
12 pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$3 million in net proceeds
13 for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount esti-
14 mated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

15 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the
16 department for deposit in the ODAS Economic Development Distributions Fund established
17 under ORS 461.553, for distribution to the Family YMCA of Marion and Polk Counties to de-
18 velop a centralized social service and resource center that includes affordable housing in
19 downtown Salem.

20 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs,
21 further economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks,
22 beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the following
23 findings:

24 “(a) Having housing and social services for at-risk populations is essential to Oregon’s
25 healthy economic growth; and

26 “(b) A severe shortage of affordable housing facilities and related social services exists
27 in Oregon, and market indicators demonstrate a growing gap between the supply of and the
28 demand for affordable housing.

29 “SECTION 11. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2025, at the request of the Oregon
30 Department of Administrative Services, after the department consults with Lane County, the
31 State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585
32 in an amount that produces \$7.5 million in net proceeds for the purposes described in sub-
33 section (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be
34 necessary to pay bond-related costs.

35 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the
36 department for deposit in the ODAS Economic Development Distributions Fund established
37 under ORS 461.553, for distribution to Lane County for construction of the Fairgrounds
38 Multi-Use Facility.

39 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs,
40 further economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks,
41 beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that
42 constructing the multi-use facility will enhance the economic viability of the region through
43 increased tourism, job creation and improved quality of life for the community.

44 “(4) Issuance of bonds and distribution of net proceeds to Lane County is contingent upon
45 all other financing for the project being secured.

1 **“SECTION 12. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2025, at the request of the Oregon**
2 **Department of Administrative Services, after the department consults with the City of**
3 **Hillsboro, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560**
4 **to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$15 million in net proceeds for the purposes described**
5 **in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer**
6 **to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.**

7 **“(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the**
8 **department for deposit in the ODAS Economic Development Distributions Fund established**
9 **under ORS 461.553, for distribution to the City of Hillsboro for construction of the Hillsboro**
10 **Hops Ballpark.**

11 **“(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs,**
12 **further economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks,**
13 **beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that**
14 **constructing the ballpark will enhance the economic viability of the region through increased**
15 **tourism, job creation and improved quality of life for the community.**

16 **“(4) Issuance of bonds and distribution of net proceeds to the City of Hillsboro is con-**
17 **tingent upon all other financing for the project being secured.**

18 **“SECTION 13.** Section 11, chapter 596, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to read:

19 **“Sec. 11. (1) A public university that is carrying out a qualified project shall require each**
20 **contractor in a contract with an estimated cost of \$200,000 or greater to:**

21 **“(a) Employ apprentices to perform 15 percent of the work hours that workers in apprenticeable**
22 **occupations perform under the contract, in a manner consistent with the apprentices’ respective**
23 **apprenticeship training programs;**

24 **“(b) Establish and execute a plan for outreach, recruitment and retention of women, minority**
25 **individuals and veterans to perform work under the contract, with the aspirational target of having**
26 **at least 15 percent of total work hours performed by individuals in one or more of those groups;**

27 **“(c) Provide health insurance and retirement benefits to workers; and**

28 **“(d) Require any subcontractor engaged by the contractor to abide by the requirements set forth**
29 **in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of this subsection, if the work to be performed under the subcontract**
30 **has an estimated cost of \$200,000 or greater.**

31 **“(2) On or before February 1 of each year, each public university that is carrying out a qualified**
32 **project shall report to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means or Joint Interim Committee on**
33 **Ways and Means, as part of the report required under ORS 350.379, on:**

34 **“(a) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by apprentices;**

35 **“(b) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by women, minority individuals and**
36 **veterans; and**

37 **“(c) The types and costs of health insurance and retirement benefits provided to workers by**
38 **contractors and subcontractors.**

39 **“(3) The requirements of this section are in addition to, and not in lieu of, the requirements**
40 **imposed under ORS 350.379.**

41 **“(4) As used in this section:**

12 in section 1 (6)(i)(E) [*of this 2023 Act.*], **chapter 596, Oregon Laws 2023**; and

13 “(E) **The Southern Oregon University Central Hall Capital Improvements (Phase II) ref-**
14 **erenced in section 1 (6)(i)(F), chapter 596, Oregon Laws 2023, as amended by section 1 of this**
15 **2024 Act.**

16 “(f) ‘Veteran’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 408.225.

17 “(g) ‘Woman’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 200.005.
