¹ "<u>SECTION 12.</u> (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2025, at the request of the Oregon ² Department of Administrative Services, after the department consults with the City of ³ Hillsboro, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 ⁴ to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$15 million in net proceeds for the purposes described ⁵ in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer ⁶ to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

"(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the
department for deposit in the ODAS Economic Development Distributions Fund established
under ORS 461.553, for distribution to the City of Hillsboro for construction of the Hillsboro
Hops Ballpark.

"(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs, further economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that constructing the ballpark will enhance the economic viability of the region through increased tourism, job creation and improved quality of life for the community.

16 "(4) Issuance of bonds and distribution of net proceeds to the City of Hillsboro is con-17 tingent upon all other financing for the project being secured.

"SECTION 13. Section 11, chapter 596, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to read:

19 "Sec. 11. (1) A public university that is carrying out a qualified project shall require each 20 contractor in a contract with an estimated cost of \$200,000 or greater to:

"(a) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by apprentices;
