# B-Engrossed Senate Bill 1585

Ordered by the Senate February 29 Including Senate Amendments dated February 19 and February 29

### SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure. The statement includes a measure digest written in compliance with applicable readability standards.

Digest: The Act requires DHS to set up a task force and come up with a plan for a program that allows people who receive SNAP aid to be able to use the aid to buy hot foods and hot foods that are ready to eat. The Act says who must be on the task force. The Act requires DHS to take steps to carry out the program. (Flesch Readability Score: 87).

Requires the Department of Human Services to convene a task force to analyze options available under federal law for a program that allows recipients of Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits to use the benefits for hot foods, including restaurant meals. Specifies the membership of the task force. Requires the department to implement the program on a statewide basis or as a pilot program.

Takes effect on the 91st day following adjournment sine die.

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits; and prescribing an effective date.

3 Whereas many of the hungriest Oregonians who rely on Supplemental Nutrition Assistance

4 Program benefits face the most significant barriers to obtaining adequate nutrition from traditional

5 groceries, including the lack of kitchen facilities or the means of preparing and cooking meals,

6 special dietary needs or the need for specific foods due to prescription medications that they must 7 take; now, therefore,

8 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

## 9 <u>SECTION 1.</u> (1) The Task Force on Maximizing Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Pro-

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To the extent permitted by federal law, the Department of Human Services shall allow 1 recipients of Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits who lack access to kitchen 2 facilities or a means of preparing meals to use the benefits to purchase hot foods and hot 3 foods that are ready for immediate consumption, including restaurant meals. 4 SECTION 3. The amendments to section 1 of this 2024 Act by section 2 of this 2024 Act 5 become operative one year after receipt of any approval that is necessary to carry out the 6 plan for implementing the program described in section 1 of this 2024 Act or one year after 7 the notification from the United States Secretary of Agriculture that no federal approval is 8 9 necessary. SECTION 4. The Department of Human Services shall notify the Legislative Counsel im-10 mediately upon receipt of: 11 12(1) Any federal approval described in section 3 of this 2024 Act or the denial of approval; 13 or (2) Notification from the United States Secretary of Agriculture that no approval is 14 15necessary. SECTION 5. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation 16 made to the Department of Human Services by section 1 (3), chapter 610, Oregon Laws 2023, 17 for the biennium ending June 30, 2025, for self-sufficiency programs, is increased by \$481,371 18 for carrying out section 1 of this 2024 Act. 19 SECTION 6. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on 20expenditures established by section 3 (3), chapter 610, Oregon Laws 2023, for the biennium 2122ending June 30, 2025, as the maximum limits for payment of expenses from federal funds, but 23excluding federal funds not described in section 2, chapter 610, Oregon Laws 2023, collected or received by the Department of Human Services, for self-sufficiency programs, is increased 24 25by \$698,970 for carrying out section 1 of this 2024 Act.

26 <u>SECTION 7.</u> This 2024 Act takes effect on the 91st day after the date on which the 2024 27 regular session of the Eighty-second Legislative Assembly adjourns sine die.

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
