## **Senate Concurrent Resolution 212**

## **SUMMARY**

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.** The statement includes a measure digest written in compliance with applicable readability standards.

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Digest: Honors the life and memory of Clifford Trow. (Flesch Readability Score: 71.8). In memoriam: Clifford Trow, 1929-2023.

2	Whereas Clifford W. Trow was born in Topeka, Kansas, on July 27, 1929; and
3	Whereas in 1951, Clifford Trow graduated with high honors from Kansas Wesleyan University
4	and promptly embarked upon a career as a high school social studies teacher; and
5	Whereas Clifford Trow resumed his schooling later in the decade, graduating with a Master of
6	Arts from the University of Colorado in 1958, and eight years later he completed his PhD, also from
7	the University of Colorado; and
8	Whereas following the completion of his PhD, Clifford Trow moved to Oregon, where he assumed
9	a position on the history faculty at Oregon State University; and
10	Whereas as an academic, Clifford Trow's research interests included the presidency of Woodrow
11	Wilson as well as American foreign policy in Mexico and elsewhere; and
12	Whereas not long after his arrival in Corvallis, Oregon, in 1965, Clifford Trow met Jo Anne
13	Johnson, and in 1969 the couple married; and
14	Whereas in 1972, Clifford Trow received the Binkley-Stephenson Award from the Organization
15	of American Historians for his paper "Woodrow Wilson and the Mexican Interventionist Movement
16	of 1919," published in the Journal of American History; and
17	Whereas Clifford Trow remained on staff at Oregon State University for more than thirty years,
18	retiring in 1996; and
19	Whereas Clifford Trow was active in Democratic Party politics from his days in Colorado, and
20	he ran for the Oregon Senate in 1970, losing the District 18 race to incumbent Dick Hoyt; and
21	Whereas undeterred, Clifford Trow ran again four years later, this time winning the Senate seat
22	and beginning a period of service in the Oregon Senate that would last for nearly three decades
23	until his retirement in 2003; and
24	Whereas as a steadfast supporter of education, Clifford Trow served on the Senate Education
25	Committee for eight sessions, including five as chair; and
26	Whereas in 1979, Clifford Trow was recognized as Education Senator of the Year by the Oregon

Senate Ways and Means in 1993 and subcommittees of Ways and Means from 1985 to 1991; and

Whereas Clifford Trow was a member of numerous additional legislative committees, chairing

- Whereas Clifford Trow and his beloved wife, Jo Anne, remained active in retirement, devoting their energies to numerous civic groups including Oregon State University's Academy for Lifelong Learning, which he cofounded, as well as the Benton County Historical Society and the Old Mill Center for Children and Families; and
- Whereas Clifford Trow passed away on October 31, 2023; and

Whereas Clifford Trow is remembered as a man of principle and integrity, as a devoted and supportive husband, as a committed champion for social justice, and as a model of a dedicated public servant who left the world a better place; now, therefore,

## Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

- That we, the members of the Eighty-second Legislative Assembly, recognize and honor Clifford W. Trow for his lifetime of service and dedication to the people of the State of Oregon; and be it further
