**“DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION**

5 **“SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the**  
6 **General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Education by**  
7 **section 2 (3), chapter 449, Oregon Laws 2023, for the biennium ending**  
8 **June 30, 2025, to be distributed as grants-in-aid, for program costs and**  
9 **to purchase services, for youth development programs, is increased by**  
10 **\$2,500,000, for the East Metro Outreach, Prevention and Intervention**  
11 **program.**

12 **“SECTION 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the**  
13 **General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Education by**  
14 **section 1 (1), chapter 449, Oregon Laws 2023, for the biennium ending**  
15 **June 30, 2025, for operations, is increased by \$1,988,595, for curriculum**  
16 **supplements related to the dangers of synthetic opioids.**

3 creased by \$2,700,000, for relief nurseries.

11 **tutions in the following amounts to be used for education and training**  
12 **to expand the behavioral health workforce in Oregon, which may in-**  
13 **clude awarding stipends, fellowships, scholarships or any other type**  
14 **of tuition assistance to students; providing behavioral and mental**  
15 **health services to individuals from underserved communities, includ-**  
16 **ing individuals who are veterans, homeless or living in rural environ-**  
17 **ments; partnering with community organizations and labor**  
18 **management partnerships to develop career pathways; developing ed-**  
19 **ucation and training programs; and any other method reasonably**  
20 **necessary to expand access to education and training in this state for**  
21 **the next generation of behavioral and mental health practitioners:**

15 **is increased by \$818,361, for the purpose of carrying out the provisions**

23 creased by \$7,543,529, for the purpose of carrying out the provisions  
24 of chapter \_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2024 (Enrolled House Bill 4002).

25 **“SECTION 33.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the  
26 General Fund appropriation made to the Public Defense Services  
27 Commission by section 1 (7), chapter 481, Oregon Laws 2023, for the  
28 biennium ending June 30, 2025, for Court Mandated Expenses, is in-  
29 creased by \$3,000,000, for the purpose of carrying out the provisions  
30 of chapter \_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2024 (Enrolled House Bill 4002).

1 **“SECTION 34. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the**  
2 **General Fund appropriation made to the Public Defense Services**  
3 **Commission by section 1 (6), chapter 481, Oregon Laws 2023, for the**  
4 **biennium ending June 30, 2025, for Preauthorized Expenses, is in-**  
5 **creased by \$1,647,542, for the purpose of carrying out the provisions**  
6 **of chapter \_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2024 (Enrolled House Bill 4002).**

7 **“SECTION 35. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the**  
8 **General Fund appropriation made to the Public Defense Services**  
9 **Commission by section 1 (10), chapter 481, Oregon Laws 2023, for the**  
10 **biennium ending June 30, 2025, for the Special Programs, Contracts**  
11 **and Distributions Division, is increased by \$2,056,436, for the unrepre-**  
12 **sented defendant/persons crisis and a misdemeanor training collab-**  
13 **oration with law schools.**

17 **“SECTION 36. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropri-**  
18 **ation, there are appropriated to the Oregon Department of Adminis-**  
19 **trative Services, for the biennium ending June 30, 2025, out of the**  
20 **General Fund, the following amounts, for provision of grants to the**  
21 **following entities for the following purposes:**

22 **“(1) \$600,000 to New Directions Northwest, Inc., to build a crisis re-**  
23 **ceiving center addition to the Recovery Village Crisis Stabilization and**  
24 **Detox Center.**

25 **“(2) \$5,000,000 to Benton County Health Department Behavioral**  
26 **Health Division to relocate Children and Family Services.**

27 **“(3) \$4,000,000 to Clackamas County for the construction of a crisis**  
28 **stabilization center.**

29 **“(4) \$500,000 to Clatsop Behavioral Healthcare to acquire detox and**  
30 **substance use disorder treatment residential beds.**

1       “(5) \$400,000 to Coos Health and Wellness for the development of a  
2 sobering center.

3       “(6) \$525,000 to BestCare Treatment Services, Inc., to expand detox  
4 capacity in central Oregon.

5       “(7) \$1,500,000 to Deschutes County Community Mental Health Pro-  
6 gram to support the Deschutes County Stabilization Center.

7       “(8) \$5,000,000 to Adapt Integrated Health Care to support the con-  
8 struction of the Adapt Recovery Campus.

9       “(9) \$500,000 to Addictions Recovery Center, Inc., for sobering center  
10 operations.

11       “(10) \$1,000,000 to Addictions Recovery Center, Inc., to support the  
12 Substance Use Disorder Withdrawal Management Expansion project.

13       “(11) \$1,500,000 to BestCare Treatment Services, Inc., to develop  
14 culturally specific substance use disorder residential treatment capac-  
15 ity.

16       “(12) \$2,400,000 to Klamath Basin Behavioral Health to support the  
17 construction of a residential treatment facility with a crisis stabiliza-  
18 tion center.

19       “(13) \$2,500,000 to Transformations Wellness Center for the con-  
20 struction of a residential, co-occurring, substance use disorder treat-  
21 ment facility with detox beds.

22       “(14) \$4,000,000 to Willamette Family, Inc., to support the con-  
23 struction of the Willamette Family Medical Detox and Resident Ser-  
24 vices facility.

25       “(15) \$3,500,000 to Lincoln County Health and Human Services De-  
26 partment to support the Lighthouse Village Apartments Mental Health  
27 Housing project.

28       “(16) \$5,750,000 to Lifeways, Inc., for the Ontario Medical Plaza  
29 project to convert vacant retail space into an integrated healthcare  
30 facility with supported housing units.

1       “(17) \$11,500,000 to Bridgeway Recovery Services, Inc., for the de-  
2 velopment of the Bridgeway Medical Center and substance use disorder  
3 treatment residential facilities.

4       “(18) \$10,000,000 to Multnomah County to support the construction  
5 of a behavioral health drop-off center.

6       “(19) \$4,000,000 to the 4th Dimension Recovery Center (4D Recovery)  
7 to support the acquisition of a facility to provide adolescent substance  
8 use disorder residential and outpatient services.

9       “(20) \$4,000,000 to Cascade AIDS Project to purchase the Prism  
10 Health facility located on North Morris Street, Portland, Oregon.

11       “(21) \$333,000 to Wallowa Valley Center for Wellness to support  
12 phase 2 of the Park Street Transitional Housing project.

13       “(22) \$8,000,000 to Wasco County to support the development of the  
14 Mid-Columbia Center for Living Campus.

15       “(23) \$8,900,000 to Washington County Behavioral Health Division  
16 to support the development of the Center for Addictions Triage and  
17 Treatment project.

18       “SECTION 37. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropri-  
19 ation, there is appropriated to the Oregon Department of Administra-  
20 tive Services, for the biennium ending June 30, 2025, out of the General  
21 Fund, the amount of \$1,000,000, for distribution to Portland Opportu-  
22 nities Industrialization Center for a peer-to-peer mentoring outreach  
23 program.

24       “SECTION 38. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropri-  
25 ation, there is appropriated to the Oregon Department of Administra-  
26 tive Services, for the biennium ending June 30, 2025, out of the General  
27 Fund, the amount of \$150,000, for distribution to WomenFirst Transi-  
28 tion and Referral Center for the purpose of providing detox services.

29  
30               **“LEGISLATIVE POLICY AND RESEARCH COMMITTEE**

1 **SECTION 39. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the**  
2 **General Fund appropriation made to the Legislative Policy and Re-**  
3 **search Committee by section 15, chapter 383, Oregon Laws 2023, for the**  
4 **biennium ending June 30, 2025, is increased by \$400,340, for the purpose**  
5 **of supporting the task forces under sections 16 and 18, chapter \_\_,**  
6 **Oregon Laws 2024 (Enrolled House Bill 4002).**

7  
8 **“EMERGENCY BOARD**

9  
10 **SECTION 40. (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any other ap-**  
11 **propriation, there is appropriated to the Emergency Board, for the**  
12 **biennium ending June 30, 2025, out of the General Fund, the amount**  
13 **of \$4,700,000, to be allocated to the Oregon Health Authority for pay-**  
14 **ments to employers of behavioral health care providers, as described**  
15 **in section 20, chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2024 (Enrolled House Bill 4002),**  
16 **following the approval by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Ser-**  
17 **vices of the use of Federal Medical Assistance matching funds by the**  
18 **Oregon Health Authority for this purpose.**

19 **“(2) If any of the moneys appropriated under subsection (1) of this**  
20 **section are not allocated by the Emergency Board prior to December**  
21 **1, 2024, the moneys remaining on that date become available for any**  
22 **purpose for which the Emergency Board lawfully may allocate funds.**

23  
24 **“CAPTIONS**

25  
26 **SECTION 41. The unit captions used in this 2024 Act are provided**  
27 **only for the convenience of the reader and do not become part of the**  
28 **statutory law of this state or express any legislative intent in the**  
29 **enactment of this 2024 Act.**

1 **“EMERGENCY CLAUSE**

3 **“SECTION 42. This 2024 Act being necessary for the immediate**  
4 **preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is**  
5 **declared to exist, and this 2024 Act takes effect on its passage.”.**
