**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO
SENATE BILL 1501**

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 3, delete “and 458.392” and insert “,
2 458.392 and 568.976 and sections 22a and 23, chapter 10, Oregon Laws 2020
3 (second special session), sections 37 and 39, chapter 223, Oregon Laws 2023,
4 and section 33a, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2023; repealing ORS 568.974 and
5 section 33, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2023”.

6 Delete lines 5 through 28 and delete pages 2 and 3 and insert:
7

8 **“HOUSING ASSISTANCE**

9

10 **“SECTION 1.** ORS 458.392 is amended to read:

11 “458.392. (1) There is established the Long-Term Rent Assistance Fund,
12 separate and distinct from the General Fund.

13 “(2) The Long-Term Rent Assistance Fund shall consist of moneys cred-
14 ited to the fund from moneys appropriated or transferred to the fund by the
15 Legislative Assembly or received from the federal government or other
16 grants, gifts or donations from any source.

17 “(3) Moneys in the fund are continuously appropriated to the Housing and
18 Community Services Department to:

19 **“(a) Provide rental assistance and other supportive services to peo-
20 ple who are experiencing, or are at risk of experiencing, homelessness;
21 and**

1 “(b) Carry out the duties under ORS 458.390.

2
3 **“PRIVATE SECURITY ENTITIES**

4
5 **“SECTION 2. The Private Security Entity Account is established in**
6 **the State Treasury, separate and distinct from the General Fund. The**
7 **Private Security Entity Account consists of moneys deposited in the**
8 **account under ORS 181A.900 (3). Moneys in the account are contin-**
9 **uously appropriated to the Department of Public Safety Standards and**
10 **Training for the purpose of payment to persons entitled thereto.**

11 **“SECTION 3.** ORS 181A.900 is amended to read:

12 “181A.900. (1) The Department of Public Safety Standards and Training
13 shall establish by rule standards and procedures for the licensing of private
14 security entities.

15 “(2) Rules adopted under this section must require that an applicant for
16 a private security entity license:

17 “(a) Submit a written application to the Department of Public Safety
18 Standards and Training on a form approved by the department;

19 “(b) Register the entity as a business with the Secretary of State;

20 “(c) Be the principal owner or principal partner who exercises operational
21 control over the entity;

22 “(d) Designate an executive manager licensed by the department;

23 “(e) Be covered by a general liability insurance policy for which the ap-
24 plicant is a primary insured that includes public liability, personal injury
25 and property damage insurance covering all aspects of the private security
26 services being provided;

27 “(f) Maintain and make available to the department upon request records
28 of the training hours completed by each private security provider employed
29 by the entity;

30 “(g) Demonstrate the existence of use of force and citizen arrest policies,

1 unless the private security entity exclusively monitors alarm systems; and

2 “(h) Provide the following information to the department:

3 “(A) The names and addresses of all persons financially interested,
4 whether as partners, shareholders, associates or profit-sharers, in the
5 applicant’s proposed operations as a private security entity, together with
6 the amount of their respective interests, and whether or not, to the best of
7 the applicant’s knowledge, any of these persons was ever denied a certificate
8 or a license under ORS 181A.870 within the preceding three years, or had a
9 certificate or license suspended or revoked within the preceding three years;

10 “(B) Proof of the existence of adequate insurance under rules issued by
11 the department;

12 “(C) Proof of compliance with business tax requirements;

13 “(D) Any claims for unpaid wages that have been made against the ap-
14 plicant within the preceding two years;

15 “(E) The physical address of the work location or locations at which
16 private security services are provided by private security professionals em-
17 ployed by or pursuant to a contract or subcontract with the applicant; and

18 “(F) For each work location at which private security services are pro-
19 vided by private security professionals pursuant to a contract or subcontract
20 with the applicant, the names of the private security entity or entities con-
21 tracted or subcontracted with the applicant.

22 “(3) Each applicant shall submit with the application for a private secu-
23 rity entity license, proof of financial ability to promptly pay the wages of
24 executive managers, private security professionals and supervisory managers
25 employed by or who contract with the private security entity. The proof re-
26 quired in this subsection shall be in an amount and form as established by
27 the department by rule, including but not limited to, a corporate surety bond,
28 a cash deposit or a deposit the equivalent of cash. **Amounts received by**
29 **the department under this subsection must be deposited in the Private**
30 **Security Entity Account established under section 2 of this 2024 Act.**

1 “(4) The department shall establish fees for issuing licenses to private
2 security entities. The fees may not exceed the prorated direct costs of ad-
3 ministering:

4 “(a) The licensing program required by this section;

5 “(b) The license examinations required by ORS 181A.904; and

6 “(c) The investigations required by ORS 181A.902.

7 **“SECTION 4.** ORS 181A.890 is amended to read:

8 “181A.890. **Except as provided in ORS 181A.900 (3)**, all moneys received
9 by the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training under ORS
10 181A.840 to 181A.918 and 181A.995, including penalties recovered under ORS
11 181A.995 (2), shall be paid into the General Fund in the State Treasury and
12 placed to the credit of the Police Standards and Training Account estab-
13 lished in ORS 181A.665.

15 **“LOCAL GOVERNMENT HOUSING SUPPORT**

16
17 **“SECTION 5.** Section 37, chapter 223, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to
18 read:

19 **“Sec. 37.** (1) The Oregon Department of Administrative Services, in con-
20 sultation with the Department of Land Conservation and Development and
21 the Housing and Community Services Department, shall provide [*grants*] a
22 **grant to Oregon Economic Development Districts, an Oregon nonprofit**
23 **corporation, to be distributed** to councils of governments, as defined in
24 ORS 294.900, and economic development districts to support housing and
25 community development capacity within cities and counties in this state and
26 within the nine federally recognized Indian tribes in this state.

27 “(2) Councils of governments and economic development districts receiv-
28 ing [*grants*] **distributions** under this section shall partner and consult with
29 local governments, developers, financiers, the Department of Land Conser-
30 vation and Development, the Housing and Community Services Department,

1 other relevant state agencies and other interested public and private partners
2 to enable local governments throughout the region to encourage community
3 development and the development of infrastructure and needed housing, as
4 defined in [section 23, chapter 13, Oregon Laws 2023 (Enrolled House Bill
5 2001)] **ORS 197A.018**, by:

6 “(a) Bridging any information gaps;

7 “(b) Identifying and securing needed resources, including infrastructure
8 and community facilities;

9 “(c) Connecting producers of needed housing with consumers of needed
10 housing; and

11 “(d) Working with representatives of historically underrepresented groups
12 to overcome community-specific barriers to obtaining housing.

13 **“SECTION 6.** Section 39, chapter 223, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to
14 read:

15 **“Sec 39.** In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there
16 is appropriated to the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, for the
17 biennium beginning July 1, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of
18 \$5,000,000, to provide [grants] **the grant** under section 37 [of this 2023 Act],
19 **chapter 223, Oregon Laws 2023.**

21 “FUND TRANSFERS

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23 **“SECTION 7. Section 33, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2023, is repealed.**

24 **“SECTION 8.** Section 33a, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to
25 read:

26 **“Sec. 33a.** Notwithstanding ORS 243.167, the amount of [\$50,000,000]
27 **\$90,000,000** is transferred from the Public Employees’ Revolving Fund to the
28 Insurance Fund established under ORS 278.425. The transfer shall be made
29 on [May 31, 2025] **May 1, 2024.**

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1 **“TIDE GATE GRANT PROGRAM**

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3 **“SECTION 9.** Section 22a, chapter 10, Oregon Laws 2020 (second special
4 session), as amended by section 36, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2023, is
5 amended to read:

6 **“Sec. 22a.** The Tide Gate Grant and Loan Fund established under section
7 21, chapter 10, Oregon Laws 2020 (second special session), is abolished on
8 June 30, [2024] **2025**. Any moneys remaining in the fund on that date shall
9 be transferred to the Administrative Services Economic Development Fund
10 established under ORS 461.540.

11 **“SECTION 10.** Section 23, chapter 10, Oregon Laws 2020 (second special
12 session), as amended by section 37, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2023, is
13 amended to read:

14 **“Sec. 23.** Sections 21 and 22, chapter 10, Oregon Laws 2020 (second spe-
15 cial session), are repealed on June 30, [2024] **2025**.

17 **“WATER CONSERVATION PROJECTS**

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19 **“SECTION 11. ORS 568.974 is repealed.**

20 **“SECTION 12. The Oregon Department of Administrative Services**
21 **shall provide a grant to the Central Oregon Intergovernmental Council**
22 **to:**

23 **“(1) In rural areas of this state, coordinate efforts to identify and**
24 **apply for sources of funding for western juniper treatment, or other**
25 **water conservation projects, among cities, counties or other organ-**
26 **izations; and**

27 **“(2) Coordinate activities among grant recipients described in ORS**
28 **568.972.**

29 **“SECTION 13. ORS 568.976 is amended to read:**

30 **“568.976. Recipients of grants described in ORS 568.970, as well as organ-**

1 izations described in [ORS 568.974] **section 12 of this 2024 Act** and sections
2 51 and 52, chapter 606, Oregon Laws 2023, may accept moneys from state
3 agencies, federal or private funds or grants or the Emergency Board, in ad-
4 dition to the grants, for purposes described in ORS 568.970 and 568.972.

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15 **“SECTION 15. This 2024 Act being necessary for the immediate**
16 **preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is**
17 **declared to exist, and this 2024 Act takes effect on its passage.”.**

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
