To the Esteemed Members of the Senate Committee On Health Care,

In support of Senate Bill 1506, I write to you not just as an advocate for progressive principles, but as a proponent of public health, social equity, and community empowerment. The sunset clause, ending on June 30, 2026, provides a timeframe to assess the effectiveness and impact of this policy. It is a prudent measure that allows for evaluation and adjustments as needed, ensuring that the policy remains responsive to the needs of Oregonians. However, it is my hope that the success of this program will lead to its extension and eventual permanence, setting a precedent for how healthcare can be more accessible and equitable for all.

SB 1506 is a step towards a healthcare system that aligns with the values of equity, community care, and the common good. It represents an acknowledgment that healthcare should not be a privilege confined to those who can afford it or live in the right area, but a right available to all, regardless of socioeconomic status or geographic location. By supporting this bill, we take a stand for a more just and
