Dear Chair Prozanski, Vice-Chair Thatcher, and Senate Judiciary Committee members,


As a school psychologist who has worked with youth in Oregon since 1994, including in juvenile justice settings early in my career, I would like to voice my support for the passage of SB 1503. Gun violence prevention is also a priority for the National Association of School Psychologists. See infographic to the right.

For the last year and a half, I have also been serving as the co-chair on the Schools Committee for the Oregon Alliance to Prevent Suicide. We work collaboratively with OHA and ODE, as well as other committees in the Alliance including the Lethal Means committee.

Access to lethal means is an ongoing issue in Oregon. Our rates follow a trend among states showing the gun ownership numbers directly correlated to the rates of firearm injury, death and suicide. I would encourage the creation of the task force and encourage collaboration with existing organizations and subject matter experts in this area.


