It would be unconscionable to jeopardize their well-being in pursuit of short-term fiscal gains.

This is wrong for Oregon and it needs to be stopped. I implore you to reject HJR 201 and instead focus on solutions that promote responsible fiscal management while safeguarding the interests of all Oregonians. Our state deserves policies that prioritize fairness, transparency, and accountability, rather than ones that threaten to further burden those who can least afford it.
