House Agriculture, Land Use, Natural Resources and Water Committee, Chair Ken Helm and Members:

Thank you for taking this testimony about rejecting HB 4090 and in support of Amendment HB 4090 - 3, if you decide to go forward with HB 4090.

I am Trygve Steen, a resident of Portland. I bring to this issue deep experience on the implications of this legislation because of over 45 years teaching courses focused on Sustainability in relation to how we take environmentally related actions.

HB 4090 would allow a major exception for nuclear power plants to be constructed on federal lands within the state of Oregon in spite of the law enacted by the people of Oregon via the initiative process in 1980. Very importantly, that initiative required two conditions to be met before a nuclear power plant could be built in the state of Oregon: 1) a federally approved nuclear waste repository must exist for disposal of high level radioactive waste and 2) there must be a statewide vote approving building of a nuclear power plant in Oregon. HB 4090 is a blatant end-run of these vitally important requirements and does not deserve to be seriously considered. Amendment HB 4090-3 is at least a step to reduce the adverse impact of HB 4090.

For decades, I taught the essential importance of the Precautionary Principle to guide our actions for relating to the environment in a responsible manner. The essential features of the Precautionary Principle are - - " taking preventive action in the face of uncertainty; shifting the burden of proof to the proponents of an activity; exploring a wide range of alternatives to possibly harmful actions; and increasing public participation in decision making." (Environ Health Perspect. 2001 Sep; 109(9): 871–876.)

The initiative process in 1980 honored the above principles. HB 4090 profoundly violates these concepts. I therefore strongly urge rejection of HB 4090 based on its features dealing with Nuclear Power. In addition, the general implications of HB 4090 for energy facility siting in Oregon are seriously damaging as well. The existing authority of the state Energy Facility Siting Council is already working quite well and should not be abandoned.
