RE: House Bill 4071, relating to health care licensing

Chair Nosse, Co-chairs Goodwin and Nelson and Members of the Committee:

On behalf of Oregon's 61 community hospitals, the Hospital Association of Oregon appreciates your commitment to addressing barriers to health care licensing.

We support the -1 amendment to HB 4071, which would establish the Task Force on Health Professional Licensing Modernization.

Oregon has workforce shortages in a wide array of licensing categories. These shortages impact our communities, making it difficult for patients to receive the right care, at the right place, at the right time. Oregon's licensure process should not exacerbate those workforce shortages.

We support the efforts in the -1 amendment to explore barriers and recommend solutions for prompt licensing of health professionals who would like to work in Oregon. The task force is tasked with identifying roadblocks to success, including applicant-facing processes, internal processes and technical infrastructure. Removing unnecessary roadblocks in licensing is an important step to ensuring the qualified workforce that Oregon needs is available to care for Oregonians.

We appreciate the opportunity to express our support for the -1 amendment to HB 4071.
