RE: Support for SB 1567

Dear Chair Manning, Vice Chair Thatcher, and Members of the Committee

The Oregon Winegrowers Association (OWA) represents hundreds of winery and grape growing members from every winegrowing region in Oregon, and our members represent two-thirds of Oregon's overall wine production. For more than 40 years, OWA has been the leading advocate for Oregon wineries and growers. Today, we write as efficient irrigators committed to supporting water policy initiatives that promote collaborative planning, based on hydrological boundaries.

Wine grapes are an important value-added agricultural crop directly and indirectly contributing billions of dollars to the Oregon economy each year. Due to climate change, growing wine grapes in many parts of the state increasingly requires irrigating to establish new vines and sustain wine grape cultivation. Taking actions to manage resources for long-term reliable water supply is critical to not only the viability of vineyard farming in Oregon, but for meeting the needs of all water users who depend on healthy watersheds.

OWA supported SB 956 from the 2023 legislative session and writes today with support for SB 1567. Providing the legal authority for Oregon to take action to implement the Walla Walla Water 2050 Strategic Plan serves as an excellent example of varying parties with distinct political boundaries collaborating to articulate a common purpose, set of actions, and financial commitments to meet the needs of many. We understand this collaborative work to be an important first step in planning a secure water future for the Walla Walla basin, meeting in-stream and out-of-stream needs, as well as groundwater supply.

This kind of hydrological boundary management approach to planning is critical to maintaining water resources, keeping our agricultural industries and jobs growing in Eastern Oregon and throughout the state. We commend the Walla Walla Water 2050 Strategic Plan Advisory Committee including farmer members, the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation, and policymakers and regulators in WA and OR for their innovative work and we urge this committee's support of SB 1567.
