They NEED treatment and housing, not arrests, not harassment, and not sweeps.

More folks living by the Steel Bridge would have gotten into housing if not for lack of treatment resources and the final sweep that completely scattered those that were being helped by Transition Projects.

Treatment capacity is just recently increasing and we need to focus on bolstering it further, not upending the already difficult process of directly serving those on the street. Please protect our houseless neighbors by maintaining decriminalization and funding immediate capacity of addiction treatment.
