RE: Support for SB 1576A – Restoring Recreational Immunity Protections

Chair Kropf and Committee Members:

On behalf of the Coalition of Oregon Land Trusts (COLT), we thank you for the opportunity today to provide comments in support of SB 1576A, a bill to temporarily restore recreational immunity protections for public and private landowners. This legislation is captured in the Senate Judiciary Omnibus bill, which passed the Senate 25-2 on Thursday, February 22nd.

The Coalition of Oregon Land Trusts (COLT) represents 31-member land trusts, soil and water conservation districts, and conservation organizations across Oregon that are working to protect our natural world – our water, wildlife and open space – for all people, forever. As of 2023, our statewide community of land trusts had 90 properties open for public use in Oregon.

The Oregon Public Use of Lands Act provides liability protections for landowners – both public and private – who make their land available without charge for recreational use by the public. However, a recent Oregon Court of Appeals decision undermined the immunity guaranteed in the Act, which would result in a severe reduction of land available to Oregonians for their recreational use and enjoyment.

Simply put, land trusts with properties open to the public are now at greater risk of lawsuits by recreational users, and could face increased liability insurance premiums from this decision. As nonprofits, land trusts cannot afford these increased premiums, and would have to close their properties for the summer season.

Through SB 1576A, we seek to temporarily amend the Public Use of Lands Act to restore recreational immunity protections for public and private land open for recreational opportunities. As a temporary fix, this legislation has a sunset in 2026 and would necessitate bringing all parties back to the table for a more comprehensive solution in the 2025 legislative session.

To keep trails and recreation open for the summer season, we urge this Committee to pass SB 1576A and restore recreational immunity protections. Thank you for your consideration, and we thank you for the time to testify.
