






 - Forest health monitoring & preservation








2025-27 LAB & reduction targets

For reduction exercise:



Reduction option criteria

- Mitigate impacts to core business by identifying reduction options that still preserve the funding & people needed to continue operations
- Broken out proportionally across business areas based on budgeted GF/OF







Criterion #1

One-time funding for 2025-27

- While critical to addressing wildfire needs and Private Forest Accord commitments, not required for current service level
- Reduction option examples:
 - Detection cameras (\$2 million GF)
 - Landscape resiliency projects (\$2.9 million GF)
 - PFA Adaptive Management Program (\$3.1 million GF)




Criterion #2

OF limitations without matching funds

- Avoid amplification of reductions
- Unfortunately, the only purely OF operations at ODF are our state forests programs.
- Reduction option examples:
 - Services & supplies for state forests operations (\$6.2 million OF)







Criterion #3

OF limitations with options

- Alternative solutions to achieve similar outcomes
- Reduction option examples:
 - Capital improvements (\$4.4 million OF)—SB 1067 bond funding limitation provides an alternative for capital improvement and deferred maintenance needs.
 - "Extraordinary wildfire" (\$5 million OF)—Incorporation into the standard post-fire-season request to the Emergency Board provides an alternative for large fire cost limitation.
