- Immersive learning experience for every 5<sup>th</sup> or 6<sup>th</sup> grade student






#### Oregon Outdoor School

# Oregon Outdoor School Before State Funding

The experience was great for kids, but the program was...

- Inconsistent
  - Outdoor school for some
- Unpredictable
  - Funding always insecure
- Under-resourced
  - Reliant on fundraising, donations, and parent-pay
  - Lacking comprehensive evaluation





# Oregon Outdoor School After State Funding

The experience is great for kids, and now funding has...

- Expanded attendance and participation
- Created strong student outcomes
  - Research and evaluation
- Created educator professional development
- Provided predictable funding for planning and program improvement


**Percent of Outdoor School Participation by County in 2012**

Extension Service Outdoor School



# Impacts of Budget Reductions 2025-26

- Shift to shorter programs, including day-only programs
- Staff layoffs; staff:student ratios growing; fewer high school students participating
- Fewer opportunities for family and school outreach
- Program cancelation
- OSU staff layoffs
