



## Federal Cuts to Anti-Hunger Programs

- Loss of about 90 truckloads of food from the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC)
- Local Food Purchasing Agreement
- November SNAP Disruption
- HR1
  - Additional eligibility barriers to SNAP
  - Lower benefits over time
  - Takes away SNAP for 2,900 refugees, asylees, and immigrants
  - Additional state funding needed to maintain SNAP



### USDA cuts over \$1 billion in funding for schools, local food purchases

March 10 (Reuters) - The U.S. Agriculture Department has cut two federal programs that spent over \$1billion annually to help schools and food banks buy food from local farms and ranches, the agency has confirmed to Reuters.

The School Nutrition Association, which represents cafeteria workers and directors nationwide, said in a press release that the USDA cut the \$660 million Local Food for Schools program for 2025.

Politico, citing a spokesperson for the USDA, reported that the department also cut the Local Food Purchase Assistance Cooperative Agreement Program, which would have funded about \$500 million this year to support food banks.





#### Food Banks Left in the Lurch as Some Shipments Are Suspended

A representative of a nationwide food pantry network, said U.S.D.A. officials had informed him that some food aid distributed by the federal government was under review.






