Behavioral Health Workforce Incentives

House Bill 2949 (2021) Overview

Workforce Incentives - \$60M (~\$1.5M obligated to spend)

Ongoing (active grant agreements):

- Loan Repayment - \$15.7M
- Graduate Tuition Assistance & Stipends - \$10.1M
- Behavioral Health Scholarships (SHOI-Like) - \$2.1M
- Bonus and Housing Stipend Grant - \$2.8M
- Community Mental Health Program Set-Aside - \$14.5M
- Tribal Behavioral Health Set-aside - \$2.1M

Completed:

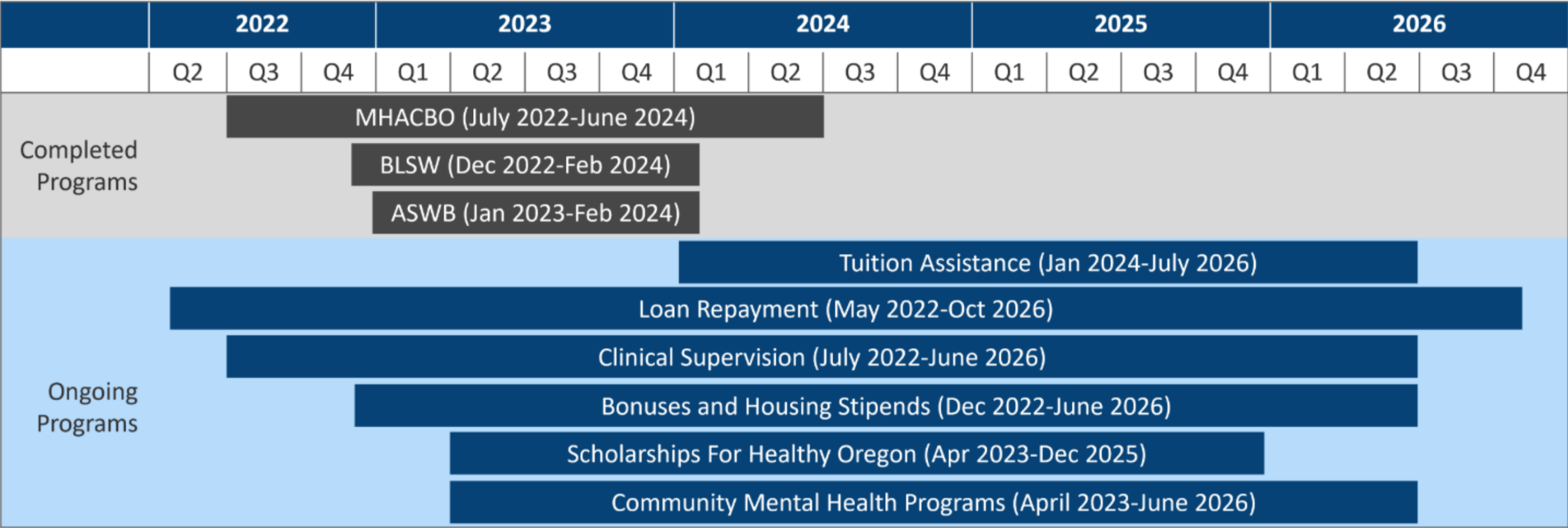
- Peer Support Services - \$5M
- Social worker exam fee vouchers and licensing fee waivers - \$768K
- Mental Health and Addiction Counselor Board of Oregon - \$3.7M

Clinical Supervision Grants - \$20M (~\$2M obligated to spend)

Ongoing:

- Clinical Supervision Expansion Grant - \$13M
- Tribal Behavioral Health Set-Aside - \$1M
- Community Mental Health Program Set-Aside - \$5.7M

House Bill 2949 (2021) Training and Education Incentives

Graduate Tuition Assistance and Stipends (\$10.1M)

- Over 800 students have been awarded tuition assistance or stipends so far.
- 126 Graduates to date: 56% Counseling, 8% MSW, 4.7% PsyD
- Graduates coming from underserved communities intend to continue to serve underserved populations upon graduation.

Behavioral Health Scholarships (SHOI-Like) (\$2.1M)

- For students and trainees enrolled in eligible BH programs (including non-graduate programs). This included peer and Qualified Mental Health Associate training.
- Funds were awarded to education and training programs to distribute.
- Over 280 Scholarships have been awarded, and 166 people have completed their training program.

House Bill 2949 (2021) Credential Incentives

Social Work Exams and Licensing

- Association of Social Work Boards: \$130K to waive licensing exam fees for 14 months. Unlimited exam attempts waived. 505 licensing exam fees waived for all social work license types.
- Board of Licensed Social Workers: \$638K for 14 months to waive licensing application and exam fees piloted to lower financial burden of social workers. 2,843 licensing fees waived (initials and renewals).

Certified Workforce Fee Waivers

- A direct agreement for \$3.7M with the Mental Health and Addiction Counselor Board of Oregon (MHACBO) to reduce barriers to registrations and exam fees.
- This paid for 7,258 registrations and provided 1,962 free exams over 3 years.
- This increased the number of certified providers in Oregon.

House Bill 2949 (2021) Clinical Supervision, Recruitment and Retention Incentives

Clinical Supervision supports individuals through the entire certification and licensure process while also incentivizing individuals to become supervisors or expand provision of supervision.

- CMHP Retention: 89% retention for supervisees; 84% for supervisors
- Other Providers: 348 credentials gained; 900 supervisees hired, 96 supervisors hired, 136 supervisors trained

CMHP Grants work to provide flexible recruitment and retention strategies that include “grow your own”.

- Most incentive categories (6/8) maintained ~80% of retention for BH providers across 34 counties.
- The most popular incentive was bonuses with 1,159 providers receiving bonuses. Which maintained retention at 78%.

Bonuses and Housing Stipends supported 20 BH employers with \$2.8M to provide hiring/retention bonuses and housing stipends to recruit and retain providers.

- The program was successful at recruiting and retaining culturally specific providers and peers (43% identified as not white).
- So far, 1K retention bonuses, 350 hiring bonuses, and 199 housing stipends have been awarded to BH providers.

Loan Repayment awarded \$15.8M to 282 BH providers across 25 counties serving Oregonians.

- \$65K - average award amounts. Retention during service commitments have remained steady at 89%.
- Completion of program surveys indicate that this incentive was effective at advancing career goals and allowing the provision of higher quality care.

Senate Bill 5525 (2023) - Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and Developmental Pediatrician Workforce

OHSU Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Program

- 2025-27 Academic Year: \$1,693,493
- 9 fellows in CAP Fellowship: 5 fellows 1st year, 4 fellows 2nd year (3 fully supported by these funds), an increase of 3 fellows/year during 2023-25 to 5 fellows/year during 2025-27
- Recruiting 5 additional fellows for 2026-2027
- 107 patients served from 6 counties in 1st quarter of agreement period
- Estimated 10 fellows total by 2026-2027, one of the largest CAP fellowships in the country.

OHSU Developmental Pediatrics Program

- 2025-27 Academic Year: \$683,501
- 1 fellow currently supported Dev. Peds. Fellowship in 2024-25
- Recruiting 2 new fellows to fill newly expanded vacancies during 2025-27

Senate Bill 5525 (2023) – High School Behavioral Health Career and Technical Training Support

Sunset-Beaverton School District - \$55,000

- 16 students completed the first year of the new CTE pilot with 51 students enrolled for the 2025-26 school year;
- Program officially recognized by Oregon Department of Education, expanding access to students from all 27 district high schools

Lane County School District - \$55,000

- 41 students currently enrolled for 2025-26 school year, representing 9 high schools with 4 programs on-site and 1 fully-online program (first in Oregon) so that rural and frontier students have access;
- All program educators fully certified in Youth and Teen Mental Health First Aid.

Salem-Keizer School District - \$75,000

- 43 students completed paid internships under the supervision of industry professionals;
- 20 students earned Peer Support Specialist (PSS) certifications;
- 25 students earned Qualified Mental Health Associate – Registration (QMHA-R) certifications;
- Established and provided a paid transportation system for rural students

Items of Note :

- Recommendations in HB 2235 and HB 4151 legislative reports for continued investment in and support of this type of workforce support program
- Senate Bill 527 (2025) was not passed but would have supported the creation of more of these programs.

House Bill 2024 (2025) Workforce Incentives and Direct Agreements

Goals:

- Strengthen recruitment and retention of behavioral health providers, especially in rural and high-need areas.
- Expand the behavioral health workforce through training and entry opportunities.
- Increase service capacity in rural and underserved communities.
- Support career advancement through education and training.
- Build system capacity for culturally responsive, equity-centered, and community-driven care.

Funding Source and amount:

- State General Funds - \$4.7M

Direct Agreements:

- Federally recognized Tribes - \$500,000
- Oregon Youth Authority - \$225,000
- 988 Crisis Hotline Vendors - \$250,000

House Bill 2024 (2025) Workforce Incentives Grant Program

The following entities are eligible to apply:

- Entities that have a Certificate of Approval
- Entities that offer medication-assisted treatment services
- Entities that are contracted with Oregon Youth Authority
- Entities that are certified opioid treatment programs
- Entities that provide withdrawal management service

04/01/2026	Anticipated project start date and initial distribution of funds begins
