

Eliminating Barriers to Health Care for Oregonians

"Well Life Medicine is a Tier 5 PCPCH—certified medical home that provides primary care, urgent care, lab services, vaccines, therapy, and mental health care. With three locations, it is poised to become the largest Medicaid primary care provider in the Salem area, employing multiple naturopathic physicians (NDs) who deliver patient-centered, evidence-based care. However, many vendors still do not accept ND orders for home health services, diabetic shoes, or durable medical equipment, creating unnecessary barriers to patient access."

Barriers

- **Hospital Access Barriers:** Many hospitals do not accept hospital admit plans from NDs, delaying timely care by forcing acutely ill patients to be admitted through the ER.
- **Durable Medical Equipment (DME) & Home Health Orders:** Insurers and vendors often refuse ND orders for DME, diabetic shoes, and home health services – forcing unnecessary visits to other clinicians.
- **No Practical Retired License Option:** NDs nearing retirement face costly active requirements or burdensome inactive status, with no flexible alternative.

Solutions

- Require hospitals to consider coordinated admit plans with NDs to prevent delays in care and reduce unnecessary ER visits.
- Require insurers and vendors to accept prescriptions of DME, diabetic shoes, and home health services from NDs, to reduce care delays and unnecessary visits, saving patients and insurers money.
- Lower the age of ND retired status from 70 to 65 to meet the needs of retiring physicians.
