

RESILIENT LANDSCAPES

Resilient lands are healthy and adaptable and can support Oregon's social, economic, and ecological needs for future generations. They can endure stressors such as drought, heat, insects and disease by adapting and recovering after these disturbances.

ODF contributes to creating more resilient landscapes through **13 federal and state programs** that enable us to deliver financial and technical assistance to landowners and partners.

Many tools help landscapes become more resilient:

- » Thinning
- » Prescribed fire
- » Invasives treatment
- » Fuels mitigation
- » Post-fire restoration choices

ODF administers several federally-funded assistance programs that contribute to landscape resiliency:

Since the federal government manages 60% of forestland in Oregon, the condition of these lands significantly impacts the overall health of Oregon's forests. Through Good Neighbor Authority and the Federal Forest Restoration Program, ODF partners with federal land managers to complete resiliency work on federal lands.
