I am strongly opposed to the Oregon transportation funding initiative. Although I understand the need for better roads and infrastructure, this proposal places an unfair burden on hardworking families and local businesses. For rural and low income Oregonians, these costs add up quickly, forcing them to choose between basic necessities and keeping their vehicles on the road. Many people are already struggling as it is. Instead of piling on more taxes, the state should focus on cutting wasteful spending, maximizing existing funds, and explore pioneering solutions such as public-private partnerships or federal grants.

I love Oregon and want to see our infrastructure flourish, but this initiative feels like a blunt instrument that punishes working-class Oregonians while offering no clear plan for success. We deserve better—a solution that prioritizes efficiency, fairness, and accountability over knee-jerk tax increases. I urge this committee and fellow Oregonians to vote no and demand a smarter approach to our transportation challenges.
