Consumption taxes, like all taxes, are regressive and will disproportionately burden low-income and working poor families.

For example, nearly all jobs with hybrid or remote work options are moderately wellpaid, and this tax will not burden those people to the same degree as a teacher or transportation or retail worker who has to show up daily to work.

If it were up to me, I would leave the gas tax and passenger registration fees where they are.

I would rather the legislature shift moneys around and away from programs that are more lofty ideal than practical policy and implement a progressive tax-structure to the existing payroll tax such that low-income and working families are not carrying the brunt of the tax burden.

Perhaps, increase the payroll tax to 0.15% for people making less than \$40k, and 0.25% for the \$40k-\$70k range, and 0.35% for the next bracket and so on. Having a progressive tax structure is the only way I can get behind new or increased taxes so that the burden is fairly distributed across incomes.
