When Sam Adams was mayor of Portland, street maintenance was non-existent. The City Auditor reported there was money in the budget to pave 5,000 lane miles a year. In his last year in office, 22 miles were repaved, and the balance of the money went to street cars and bicycles.

This year the city of Portland is 93 million dollars short of budget, yet with the IGA gave Multnomah County 100 million dollars for homelessness and laid off city employees.
