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Written Testimony before the Joint Committee On Transportation Funding

Dear Chair.

I am writing in opposition to any increased fuel or vehicle taxes.

I strongly oppose the proposed increases in fuel and vehicle-related taxes. While I understand the need to fund infrastructure and environmental initiatives, continually raising these costs places an unfair burden on working families, small businesses, and commuters who have no practical alternatives to driving.

Fuel costs are already volatile and a major factor in the rising cost of living. In short, these proposed tax hikes are regressive, harmful to working households, and economically damaging at a time when people are already struggling with high costs. They should be rejected.
