

We've been protecting Oregon's forests for 113 years by:

- Sustainably managing state forestlands for the greatest permanent value for Oregonians
- Enforcing the Forest Practices Act
- Providing assistance to private landowners, cities and counties to help cultivate sustainable urban and rural forests
- Monitoring and working to improve forest health
- Partnering on restoration of federal forestlands
- Preventing and suppressing wildfires







Who We Are

ODF is the state's largest fire department.

469 FTE/791 positions providing prevention & suppression on more than 16 million acres statewide



What We Do

We protect Oregonians, their communities and our state's natural resources from wildfires.

In 2024, ODF firefighters responded to:

- 1,005 fires on ODF protection, 301 others
- Nearly 2,300 non-fire actions


